Texas to NW Line Planned

HOUSTON 6P—Pacific Northwest Pipe Line Corporation will file an application with the Federal Power Commission to build a natural gas line from North and West Texas to Washington State, Ray C. Fish, executive board chairman said Friday.

Original plans of the company to build a line from South Texas to Washington have been shelved, he said.

Present plans call for laying a 26-inch main from the rich gas fields of North and West Texas at a cost of about \$130,000,000. It will be close to 1400 miles long, Fish said, and will have a capacity of 200 million cubic feet of gas daily.

Head plans have been changed twice. The company filed an application with FPC in June, 1950, for authority to build the line starting in South Texas. Then, before the hearing came up, he said the gas purchasers in Washington and Oregon decided Canadian gas would be cheaper.

They were the Seattle Gas Company and the Portland Gas Company.

Plans were changed again, Fish said, after the Canadian Conservation Board ruled against the company's plan to buy gas from Southern Alberta.

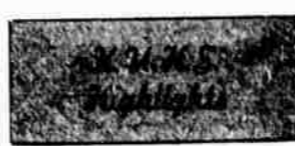
Fish and his associates recently bought the Spokane, Washington, Gas Company. He said the deal was part of the plan to bring gas from Canada to that state.
