California Sportsmans' Boss Conducts Survey Of Interstate Deer Herd

Exec. Secy. George Difani of the Organized Sportsmen of California, representing some 50,000 California hunters, anglers and outdoorsmen, said yesterday that between 1000 and 6000 deer may have died in the past winter on the concentrated deer range in the Perez area.

Kefauver Goes OK In Washington

WASHINGTON (AP)—"Things are running very nicely" in Washington State for Sen. Kefauver, says the vice chairman of his presidential campaign headquarters here. As a result, Mrs. Kathryn Stone told newsmen Thursday, the Tennessee Democrat has cancelled a tentative visit to Seattle.

Speaking before the Klamath Falls Kiwanis Club, Difani said much of the mortality was caused by malnutrition. He had personally checked that area, both from the air and on the ground. And, he asserted, those deer may have all died within a four or five day period.

Difani was in the Northern California area making a survey of the interstate herd problem, of which the winter kill is a part. In Klamath Falls he sought to bring about more cooperation between the outdoorsmen of the two states.

"Animals and birds don't bother about political boundaries," Difani said. Migratory waterfowl and the migrating deer herd are good examples.

Difani called for a more accurate count of the interstate herd. Last season, track counts showed about 19,000 deer.

California has a million anglers, the sportsman said, while Oregon has about 250,000. He said there may be a need in the future for a game license agreement between Oregon and California.

He forecast a future where antlerless and younger deer would be hunted almost all the time. He said the days of hunting big heavy-antlered deer are nearly gone.

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The sportsman, a dark-complected hefty fellow, told Kiwanians "We must champion the cause of our migratory waterfowl."

"The Klamath Basin," he said "is one of the most important spots on the whole Pacific Flyway."

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U.S. Defense Slash Eyed By House

WASHINGTON (AP)—Already cut \$4,240,638,500, a \$46,680,384,270 defense appropriation bill for 1953 became the main target Friday of a House budget-cutting drive.

But before members demanding additional military fund cuts of up to 1 1/2 billion dollars can swing into action with votes, the House must first settle fights over diplomatic representation to the Vatican and money for the controversial "Voice of America" program.

The military bill will be debated next week, assuming that the House can dispose of a \$1,000,000,000 measure financing the State, Justice and Commerce Departments and the federal courts.

"Voice of America" funds are in the latter bill, which also carries a ban against using State Department money to finance a diplomatic mission in the Vatican without Senate confirmation of a man to head it.

Some Republicans are demanding a 50 million dollar cut in "Voice" funds, while a potent group wants the Vatican provision removed.

That the big defense measure is in for a hard time was obvious before sending it to the House floor late Thursday. The Appropriations Committee refused, 23 to 17, to return it to a subcommittee for further reductions.

The top committee members, Chairman Cannon (D-Mo.) and Rep. Taber (R-N.Y.), reportedly joined in demands for additional cuts of up to 1 1/2 billion dollars.

With that kind of backing, it was apparent that amendments to make cuts would stand a good chance of approval next week.

Reds Break With Cuba

HAVANA, Cuba (AP)—Russia broke diplomatic relations with Cuba Thursday night because—she said—the island's revolutionary government turned back two Soviet diplomatic couriers carrying secret bags of documents from Mexico City.

A sharp note from Moscow said refusal to admit the two couriers deprived the Soviet legation of normal diplomatic links with the Kremlin.

Cuban sources have charged the Russian legation in Havana was a center for Communist spying and intrigues stretching through all Latin America.

The English-language Havana Post said in an editorial Cuba herself may have been on the verge of breaking relations with Moscow because of these activities.

Cuba's reply to the Moscow note said the couriers came without previous notice, required to arrange inspection-free clearance of their luggage. They were sent back to Mexico City at once after they refused to let inspectors look through their 150-pound suitcases.

The Cuban reply also noted the couriers arrived at a time when the Soviet Union had not given diplomatic recognition to the regime of Fulgencio Batista, who seized power in a military coup March 10.

Russia's legation is headed by Guennadi Fomin, charge d'affaires, and includes four accredited diplomats. A special police guard protected the legation Thursday night. There were indications the Soviet staff would leave quite soon.

The legation is under the supervision of the Soviet embassy in Washington.
