New Elevators To Be Built

HEPPNER—Two additional grain storage elevators will be built by the Morrow County Grain Growers as part of a \$365,000 expansion program. The directors decided on that at their meeting here this week. One of the elevators will be built at Ruggs on the Heppner-Condor Highway and the other on the Lexington-Echo Highway some 10 to 12 miles north of Lexington. Manager Bill Richards said it was hoped that both new elevators—located in areas where there has not been enough storage capacity—would be ready for the crop this year. The new elevators will add about a half million bushels of storage to the Grain Growers' total, boosting capacity to one and a half million in six elevators.
