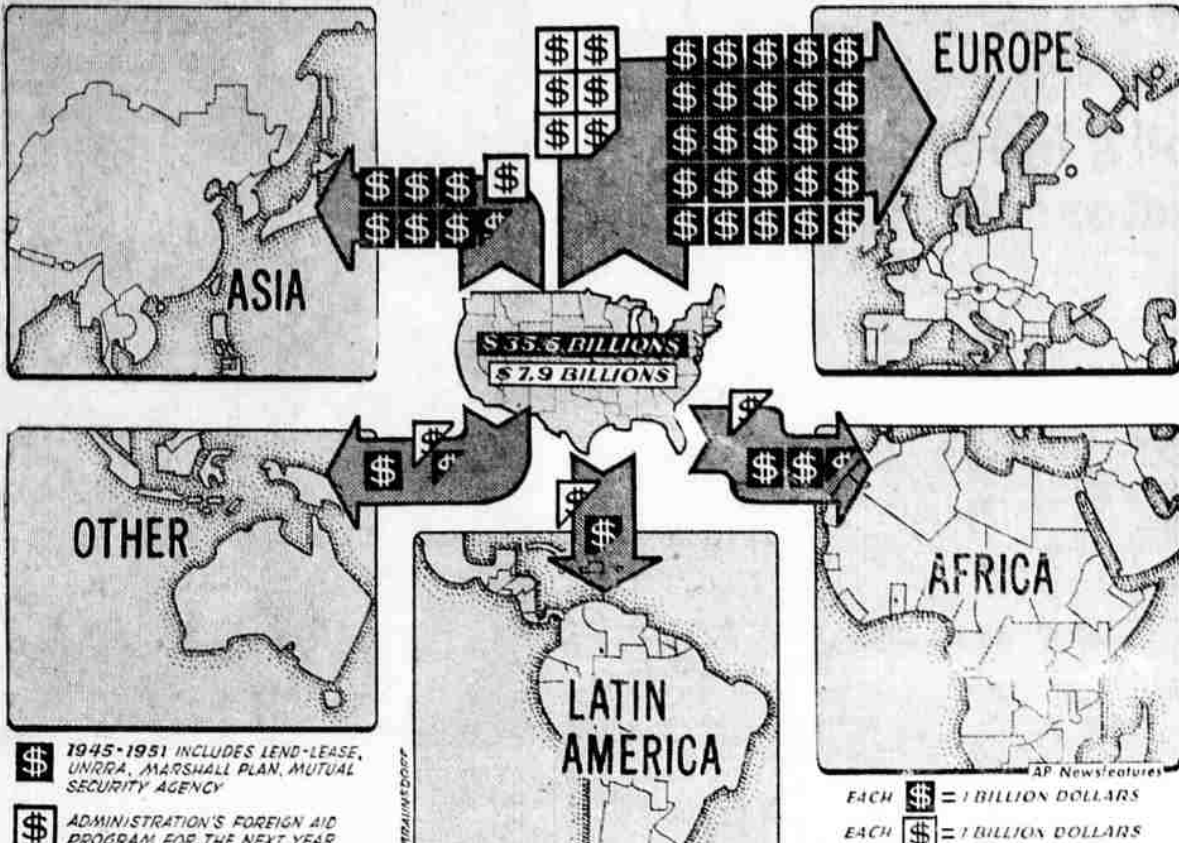


Toting Up U.S. Foreign Aid-Past and Present

The President's request for \$7.9 billion in foreign aid for the fiscal year starting July 1 is before Congress. It faces close scrutiny for this is an election year when the pressure for economy is unusually strong.

In the almost seven years since the end of World War II, the United States has put up a total of \$35.6 billion for its global economic and military assistance programs. The accompanying map shows the geographical distribution of this huge sum and where the Administration's program for fiscal 1952 would go.

By far the greater portion of American foreign aid, \$24.7 billion, has gone to western Europe. The other areas and their amounts of U.S. aid are Africa and the Middle East \$2.5 billion, Far East \$6.4, Latin America \$0.76 billion, all other \$1.35 billion.

The Administration program for Europe \$5.5 billion, Africa and the Middle East \$0.7 billion, Far East \$1 billion, Latin America \$0.2 billion, all other \$0.2 billion.

By far the greater portion of this has been economic aid. Until the end of 1951, only \$1.3 billion of the European total had been for military purposes.

All that is changed now. The President's new foreign aid program would allocate \$5.3 billion for direct military aid, \$1.8 billion for defense support industries and only \$700 million for economic and technical assistance.

In seven postwar years, U.S. foreign aid has changed almost completely in character. What started as rehabilitation and economic aid has become largely military assistance.

Lewis' take a look at the record. European Recovery and UNRRA were carryovers from the war and accounted for relatively little of the \$35.5 billion total—\$4.5 billion. Other programs under which this foreign aid was distributed include the European Recovery Program \$10.7 billion, loans and credits \$11 billion, relief in occupied areas \$5.4 billion, Mutual Defense Assistance \$2 billion, all other \$1.9 billion.

The Marshall Plan was a co-ordinated long-range program started in 1947 to help put Europe on its economic feet. There were other little "Marshall Plans" for the Far East, the Middle East and Latin America.

The primary purpose of all these plans at the time of their inception in 1947 and 1948 was economic pump-priming. The U.S. hoped to thwart the spread of communism by stabilizing conditions in shaky areas. Italy, France and the occupied portions of Germany and

Austria were particular trouble spots.

Britain was in dire economic straits but communism was not a threat there.

A notable exception in this period was the Truman Doctrine which provided \$400 million for Greece and Turkey. This was almost entirely a military aid program to combat communism.

The transition from economic rehabilitation to military preparedness was intensified by the Korean war. By mid-1950 many western European countries were beginning to operate in the black for the first time since the war. The new rearmament budgets created a burden their economies could not bear by themselves.

American foreign aid has been distributed under a number of different programs. At first the Marshall Plan was known formally as the European Recovery Program (ERP), then it was the Economic Cooperation Administration (ECA). Later it was the Mutual Defense Assistance Program (MDAP). Currently it is the Mutual Security Agency (MSA). There is also the Point Four program.

But whatever the initials, the funds come from the pockets of the U.S. taxpayer.

Clouds Halt Plane Flights

SEOUL, Korea (P)—Rain and clouds over Korea Monday morning grounded United Nations Command warplanes and made life miserable for the foot soldier at the front.

Only weather reconnaissance planes took to the air, said a U.S. official. "It was raining all over the peninsula."

On Sunday U.S. Sabre jet pilots reported they destroyed four MIG-15 Communist jets, probably destroyed two and damaged eight in three fights over Northwestern Korea.

One of the kills was credited to Capt. Iven C. Kincheloe, Caspelle, Mich. It made him America's 19th jet ace.

He bagged his fifth MIG in a 40-minute battle between 24 Sabres and 12 MIGs just south of the Yalu River boundary between Manchuria and Korea.

U. N. and Red patrols skirmished lightly on the muddy battlefield Monday morning.

The U.S. Eighth Army said an Allied patrol fought inconclusively with three Chinese Red platoons for a short time east of Kumsong on the Central Front before dawn Monday.

The Army said Allied troops Sunday reconquered without opposition a hill northwest of Yonchon on the Central Front, near the scene of a two-hour battle Saturday night between U. N. infantrymen and 750 to 850 Chinese Reds.

U.S. Loggers To Panama

BREMERTON Wash.—A band of ambitious loggers and their families are making a big leap from Pacific Northwest forests to the tropical jungles of Panama.

The Lewis and Son Logging Co., a logging concern at the Kitsap County town of Crosby, are more than 30 years old. They have become the Lewis Logging Co. of Panama, Inc. Their axes and saws will henceforth bite into mahogany, rather than Douglas fir and cedar.

Their new base of operations is a trek to Bill Lewis, a 34-year-old Crosby native, who has been in the logging business 15 years.

"It had to come, Lewis said. "This country is about logged out. There isn't enough timber to go around any more. We'll keep our property here and maybe in 25 years we'll come back and log it."

Many Pacific Northwest logging interests would dispute that statement.

In a gigantic moving effort, Lewis has transferred everything from giant bulldozers, "cherry pickers" (portable hoists), trucks and power saws on ships to the tropics.

He is taking many of his loggers with him, although they will work in supervisory capacities only, with Panamanian natives doing the actual work in the woods.

"Going into that territory will be just like it would have been to come into the Puget Sound country a hundred years ago," Lewis said. "Those people know little or nothing about modern logging methods."

"Nearly 200 natives are employed now, cutting trails. We are building our own cities in the wilderness. We'll have our own airstrip, float base and barracks for the men."

Lewis said he understood the growth of trees in four weeks in Panama is equivalent to a year's growth in the Pacific Northwest. The company's holdings cover in excess of 900 square miles.

Although the Kitsap County men and their families plan to be more or less permanent residents of Panama, they expect to remain American citizens.
