Reds Outshine U.N. Trucers

PANMUNJOM, Korea (AP) — You can't see the truce talks for the trees.

Big shady trees, too.

The Communists planted them overnight as part of their steady program of "keeping up with the capitalist Joneses." Here's a record of how that face-saving game has gone:

1. The U.N. delegates, last November, began using sedans to travel to the truce talks when weather prevented use of helicopters.
2. The U.N. Command installed walkways leading up to their entrances to the conference tents. The Communists followed suit.
3. The Allies built new latrines. The enemy tagged along with the same innovation.
4. In mid-winter, the U.N. Command built two sentry boxes for military police who stand at attention in front of the truce tents. They were painted green. Not until Friday did the Communists show up with sentry boxes—painted with orange, white and olive green stripes. They looked like barber poles. The Americans were so tickled they laughed out loud. Apparently the Reds couldn't stand ridicule, Saturday the boxes were re-painted drab green.
5. Several weeks ago the Allies landscaped their walks with small, bushy trees. The following day the

Reds lined their walks with neatly arranged bricks.

6. Recently the U.N. Command planted more small, bushy trees. But Saturday the Communists had their big moment. Allied delegates arrived to find the enemy side of the conference tents a place transformed. It was studded with a dozen large shade trees.

Not only that—the Communists had laboriously painted every one of the red bricks lining their walk in glistening white.

Accidental Shot Fatal

PORTLAND (AP) — Gerald Rosa, 15, who police said accidentally shot and killed his younger sister, was found late Sunday, eight hours after he fled from his Tigard home, scene of the shooting.

The sister, Angela, 12, was shot as she was combing her hair. The bullet which police said was apparently fired from a gun that Gerald was examining, shattered a mirror the girl was holding and entered her body just above the heart.

Police said another sister, Margaret, 16, told them she heard the shot from the kitchen. She rushed to the front room and saw her sister was wounded. Gerald ran from the house to ask a neighbor to telephone a doctor.

By the time a doctor arrived, Rosa was dead.

Gerald, meantime, had disappeared. He wandered into Portland and was headed back in the general direction of Tigard when he was spotted by Multnomah County sheriff's deputies.

Asked his name, the boy began sobbing and said "I'm Jerry."

Police said he did not know that his sister was dead. They did not tell him immediately.

Youth Held For Murder

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore. (AP) — A 15-year-old boy lured an 18-year-old deaf girl into the woods to pick wild flowers and then fatally shot her, a district attorney reported Sunday.

The youth, Elmer Belcher, shot the girl, a deaf mute, to halt "taunts directed at him about her pregnancy," District Attorney C. E. Lucky said.

The boy, although he admitted the shooting, did not admit intimacy with the girl, Mary Ellen Campbell, Lucky said.

Her body was found Saturday near her farm home. A bouquet of wilted wild flowers still was clutched in her hand. The boy's father, Harlan Belcher, found the body after her parents reported the girl missing.

She had never attended school and was barely able to talk. An autopsy revealed she was about five months pregnant.

Lucky said the youth will be charged with first degree murder.

Negroes Blast African Laws

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Thousands of South African non-whites launched a nationwide campaign against Prime Minister Daniel F. Malan's race laws Sunday. Initial rallies in the country's major cities went off peacefully.

Leaders of Negro, Asiatic and colored (mixed blood) organizations hoped the drive would develop into a full-scale passive resistance movement aimed at crushing the government's policy of apartheid, or race segregation.

As strong police and military forces stood by the non-whites demonstrated in Capetown, Durban, Port Elizabeth and Johannesburg.

The government has power to jail anyone organizing passive resistance movements or urging social changes, but no leaders were arrested. Neither did widespread forecasts of clashes between police and demonstrators materialize.
