Olympics Eye NCAA Champs

MADISON, Wis. (AP)—The Olympic board Monday to one of this nation's best college boxers and a 19th century candidate from the Hawaiian Islands.

The collegians, crowned NCAA mat champions Saturday night, earned with their titles a chance to compete for berths on the U.S. Olympic team this summer. The meet was sanctioned by the Olympic committee as a regional qualifying test.

Individual champions are Heavyweight Bob Rank of Wisconsin, Light-heavyweight Chuck Stewart of Michigan State, Featherweight Neil Orlin of Minnesota and three repeaters: Ray Kobayama of the University of Hawaii, whose lightweight triumph was the first NCAA mat trophy ever won by an Islander; Frank Echavarría of Idaho, who won with the bantamweight title the John LaRose trophy; and middleweight Webb of Idaho State, light middleweight, and Gordon Cladson of Washington State, middleweight.

Slaten punched out the meet's top upset in the semifinals, when he dunned Everett Conley of Washington State, who was seeking his third straight lightweight title.

Snead Wins Masters
AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP)—It could be that Sam Snead didn't win the 1952 Masters Golf Tournament but that four others lost it.

That's what a lot of folks were saying as they left the Augusta National Course late Sunday after Snead hung up a mediocre 286 and no another golfer could get close to it.

His final round was a par 72. That 286 was the worst four rounds of victorious golf ever shot in a Masters' but still it was good enough to give the mountaineer from West Virginia a four-stroke margin over Jack Burke Jr.

Behind Burke came Jim Ferrier, Tommy Bolt and Al Bessellink with 291 and then Lloyd Mangrum with 292.
