## King Cleared in Tax Case

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional colleagues have formally cleared Rep. King (D-Calif.) of improperly intervening in tax cases.

Rumors had circulated that King, chairman of a subcommittee investigating tax scandals, had taken an improper interest in cases involving taxpayers at Long Beach, Calif.

King himself ordered an investigation into the reports.

The Ways and Means Committee Wednesday filed with the House its report on the investigation. The rumors it said, were "unfounded" and the probe failed to disclose any trace of "improper intervention" by King.

## Will Shorty Laugh Last?

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Do they call you Shorty? Don't fret. Chances are you'll have the last laugh on the big fellows.

Dr. William H. Sheldon, director of the Constitution Laboratory at Columbia University's College of Physicians and Surgeons, reports a study of 4,000 men showed that "There is an undoubted tendency for the very long-lived men in our American population to be short."

He even suggested to the American Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation convention Wednesday the possibility of retarding the early growth of babies to insure them a longer life.

## Ravner Says Unity Needed

WALLA WALLA (AP) — The Pacific Northwest must display greater unity of purpose to attain full development of potentials of the Columbia River Basin, Dr. Paul Ravner told the Columbia Basin Interagency Committee Wednesday.

Dr. Ravner, administrator of the Bonneville Power Administration, said without a united front the Northwest never will obtain congressional appropriations of the size required to develop water resources.

"It seems obvious," he said, "that the lack of unity within the region is the principal reason why our water development program is not going ahead on schedule."

Dr. Ravner said the river's power potential of 30,000,000 or more kilowatts can be achieved only if every possible opportunity for upstream storage is utilized.

Gova McKay of Oregon, Langlie of Washington and Jordan of Idaho shared the speaker's platform with the Bonneville administrator.

## Apple Products Going Higher

WASHINGTON (AP) — Applesauce and apple cider are going to cost you more money, the government says.

The Office of Price Stabilization said it has approved higher ceilings for apple processors.

That means, an OPS spokesman said, retail prices of canned and bottled apple products will go up from one to five cents.

Sample increase: Applesauce, a penny a can; canned apples, two cents; ordinary size cans of apple juice and cider, four cents; big cans, five cents.

## U.S. to Hike Pork and Eggs

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary Brannan bowed to a Congressional recommendation Thursday and ordered government buying of pork and eggs in an effort to bolster their prices.

He announced the Agriculture Department will order to buy a "substantial" amount of smoked pork and up to 500,000 cases of eggs for use next fall by the government-sponsored non-profit school lunch program.

Brannan said the purchases would divert supplies from markets temporarily burdened with surpluses.

A House Appropriations Committee recently urged such action to strengthen farm prices of these products. It was particularly concerned over a department forecast that hog production this year may drop 9 per cent because of low prices.

The cabinet officer has insisted that a better method of supporting prices would be to make payments to farmers when prices fell below predetermined support levels.

## Midwest Has Strong Quake

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — A survey of damage from Wednesday's earthquake, described by seismologists as "moderately strong," has unearthed only one casualty.

The quake was felt in portions of seven Midwestern states.

Mrs. Della Deshaw, 74, of Tulsa, was cut and bruised by falling plaster at her home. She was not seriously injured.

Otherwise, the damage seems confined to cracked walls, falling bricks, sagging boards, and mental strain.

The quake was felt from North Texas to Omaha and Des Moines, with the main force centered in Central Oklahoma. It was called "one of the strongest ever recorded from the Midwest-United States" by seismograph specialists at St. Louis University.

## Exercise Long Horn Ends

FORT HOOD, Tex. (AP) — Exercise Long Horn is officially over but the generals won't gather to see how good — or bad — it was until Friday.

Most of the foreign observers who have been here since the big mock war started March 25 thought it was "good."

The First Armored Division linked up with the 80th Airborne Regimental Combat Team Wednesday and, in lightning fashion, drove to the line where the maneuver was to end April 11.

## Radioactivity Map Of US Now Being Charted; Bomb Threat Greatly Lessened

NEW YORK (AP) — The first complete daily radioactivity map of the United States is being charted here by the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission.

The map shows the radioactivity falling to the ground, and also radioactivity in the air, as both float across the United States from our A-bombs in Nevada or a Emwotok.

It could, in emergency, also show Russian A-bomb radioactivity as that floats around the world to us.

The mapping was described Wednesday by Merril Eisenbud of the commission's New York office, where he heads the monitoring system. There are radioactivity detectors in 120 weather stations and one station not a weather bureau, here in the commission's office. This more than doubles any previous monitoring.

The stations are set in a pattern of concentric circles from the Nevada bomb site ranging between 200 and 600 miles apart. They are closer together over the heavily populated east. By coincidence the mathematical grid misses Oklahoma, North Carolina and Vermont, but fully protects them with the stations along their borders. In Nevada there is extra monitoring.

For catching radioactivity from A-bombs, vacuum cleaners are stripped down to draw air through a filter pad about as big as the palm of your hand. Trays catch dust, on the paper. The papers are

## 2 Planes Hit, 12 Men Killed

CAMP EDWARDS, Mass. (AP) — An unexpected cloud formation was blamed Thursday for the collision of two Air Force planes traveling at better than 300 miles an hour over Cape Cod.

Twelve Air Force men were killed.

The last of the bodies weren't recovered until several hours after the planes crashed in flaming explosion Wednesday.

A C-47 out of Stewart Air Force Base, Newburgh, N. Y., carried 10 men. An F4U fighter carried two men. Both planes were on training flights.

Capt. Robert J. Stephenson, public relations officer at this camp's One Air Force Base, said one of the two pilots apparently was blinded by billowy clouds which floated over the camp.

Capt. Stephenson said the planes were at between 5,000 and 7,000 feet altitude when they collided.

folded for shipment and both papers and pads sent to New York. They are coming now at the rate of 400 a day.

Each paper or pad is placed in a metal cup the size of a cup cake. Each cup goes into an individual little electric furnace about as big as a small radio set. There the contents burn to white ashes, each cup producing an ash pad the size of a half dollar.

These white discs are sealed by machine inside a plastic tape eight inches between each, with each tape about 78 feet long. There is an identifying label on each "half dollar."

The tapes are run through radioactivity counting machines which measure and write the extra radioactivity from our bombs.
