Edible Easter Baskets Check Hungry Young

You needn't worry about the children stuffing themselves on over-rich Easter confections if you give them Easter baskets filled with nutritious foods. CRUNCHY PEANUT BUTTER GLAZE FOR BAKED HAM

1 cup crunchy peanut butter
pineapple chunks
1 cup honey

Blend honey and peanut butter until smooth. 45 minutes before ham is done remove from oven. Score fat into squares, spread with Peanut Butter Glaze and decorate with pineapple chunks, stuck on toothpicks. Bake uncovered in 325 oven for remaining 45 minutes.
