## Benton Draws M'Carthy Fire

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.), whose ouster from the Senate is sought by Sen. Benton (D-Conn.), moved Thursday for an investigation of Benton.

The Wisconsin legislator introduced his resolution in the Senate moved toward a possible vote on whether to continue its study into Benton's demands that McCarthy be removed from the Senate.

Among other things, the resolution called for a review of Benton's income tax returns from 1947 through 1950, and an inquiry into collection of funds for Benton's 1950 senatorial campaign.

It was the latest development in a running feud between McCarthy and Benton.

Last month McCarthy filed a two million dollar "libel, slander and conspiracy suit" against Benton.

McCarthy urged his colleagues to vote to continue the inquiry into Benton's charges against him.

He said a Senate Rules subcommittee already has investigated "every phase of McCarthy's life," and that it would be improper to shelve the investigation at this point.

McCarthy then said that because of the subcommittee had established a precedent in investigating him, he was asking for an investigation of Benton.

## Old Woodsman's Marks Found

REEDSFORT (AP) - A hundred years ago some now unknown woodsman put an ax to a young Douglas fir in the Hudson Slough area up Smith River. With the undercut well started, he cut the "Loggers" for the E. K. Wood Lumber Company recently completed the job he started. When the felled tree was brought to the mill, the old v-shaped scars were found buried under an estimated 100 rings of growth.

## Senate Approves Oregon Dam

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate Wednesday passed a bill to authorize Oregon to build a dam and dike to stop the flow of tide water into North Slough, Coos County.

The bill, already approved by the House, was amended slightly by the Senate. It must go back to the House for action on the change.

## Robbers Take Lots of Beer

Investigation was being made today by Sheriff Murray (Red) Britton of a burglary Wednesday night at M and R Market at Weyerhaeuser Junction.

Britton said a Weyerhaeuser employee on his way home from work about 1:30 a.m. today entered the front door of the market open.

Investigation revealed 8 cases of beer, \$14 in change and possibly a carton of cigarettes was missing. The sheriff said entry was made in back of the store.

## Civil Service Switch Asked

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Truman Thursday asked Congress to remove an estimated 23,000 postmasters, custom collectors and U.S. marshals from patronage rolls and put them under Civil Service.

The plans were contained in three separate government reorganization proposals covering the Post and the Department of Justice.

The proposal was similar to the plan Truman proposed last January to remove all Internal Revenue collectors, save the head of the Bureau, from political appointment and to put them under Civil Service provisions.

That proposal became law March 14 after the House and Senate in effect approved the Truman plan.

Under the new program, the Postmaster General would appoint first, second, and third class postmasters.

Custom collectors would be chosen by the Secretary of the Treasury. The attorney general would appoint U.S. marshals.

Congress has 60 days in which to vote disapproval of any of the plans. Otherwise they become effective.

The plan would take away from the Senate its power to refuse confirmation of all such appointments, coming as they now do from the President himself.

The President pointed out that several years would be required to put the proposed change into effect, because provisions would have to be made for incumbents.

Sen. Phil Hitchcock is to discuss school district reorganization legislation, and Rep. Ed Geary and Carroll Howe, Klamath County school superintendent, are to talk on state finance.

A lunch will be served at the school cafeteria at noon for a nominal cost.

The afternoon session is to be devoted to questions and discussion, and is to close at 2:15.

## Snow Runoff Storage Set

BOISE, Idaho (AP) - Bureau of Reclamation reservoirs in the Yakima River basin are being lowered to provide storage space for the anticipated heavy runoff from snow packs.

Harold T. Nelson, regional director, announced appointment of William H. Tuller, regional director of operation and maintenance, to carry out a flood protection program in collaboration with the Army Corps of Engineers and water management subcommittee of the Columbia Basin Inter-Agency Committee.

Nelson said the bureau reservoirs, primarily used to store water for irrigation, provide the bulk of flood protection in the entire basin.

Some discharges are being made now from reservoirs where runoffs assure an ample irrigation supply, Nelson said. Water in other reservoirs will be held as long as possible with later discharges to be made as runoff patterns develop.

## Investors Eye Bonus Bonds

SALEM (AP) - The Oregon Veterans Department already has received 28 inquiries from bond buyers and other investors who might be interested in buying the 46 million dollars worth of veterans bonus bonds.

W. F. Gaarenstroom, state veterans director, said this indicates there will be no trouble selling the bonds on April 23.

The first payments of the maximum \$600 bonus will start about July 1.

The Bonanza Episcopal Church, Full Gospel Church of Langell Valley and the Nazarene Church of Bonanza will conduct the service, and Bishop Lane Barton of Bend, head of Eastern Oregon Episcopal churches, will be the speaker.

Breakfast to be served in the Episcopal parish at 8:30 a.m. and the service will be held at the ranch after the road.

## California's Slates Unset

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - Californians didn't know for sure Thursday just how many presidential slates will show up in the state's June 3 primary.

The filing deadline last midnight narrowed the field down. It's two home state candidates on the Republican ticket and Senator H. Wesley Kefauver of Tennessee as the only certain on the Democratic.

Harold E. Stinson, a loser in New Hampshire, Nebraska, Wisconsin and Illinois, is out. His backers failed to obtain the required 12,500 signatures. They yanked Kefauver to restore their man to ballot.

That makes it a two-way contest for 70 GOP convention votes between third-term Governor Earl Warren and Rep. Thomas H. W. Lee (R-Calif.), stand-in candidate for an anti-Warren faction. Warren will be hard to beat.

It may take court action, however, to untangle the Democratic situation.

Kefauver, who moved on to the Pacific Northwest Thursday after campaigning in California, qualified without a hitch. Attorney General Edmund G. Brown, nominal candidate of the stranded "Roman slates," lacked 462 signatures. He needed 6,969 signatures. The number required is based on the vote for Republican and Democratic candidates in the last election for governor.

FAULTS - The county clerks held the Brown papers were defective in 12 places. The only one delegate, instead of a minimum of two, for the new (Los Angeles) 24th congressional district; and (2) the proposed slate of 72 was shy four delegates. California is allowed 76 Democratic delegates, but 16 have only a half-vote apiece—or 68 in all.

Secretary of State Frank Jordan said in Sacramento that Brown can seek a court order to compel the counties to certify the missing petitions.
