

# Clark Nips Owls Pels in Rogue Relays

## Oretech Drops 13-12 Nod

VANCOUVER, Wash. (Special)— Fighting uphill all the way, Oregon Tech splurged in the ninth inning yesterday to tie the Clark Junior College but lost a 13-12 baseball decision on a questionable bunt.

The Owls' four-run binge in the ninth knotted the count, 12-11, when Clark came to bat. Brandon and Katilas singled off Oretech pitcher Don Keaton and advanced bases on an error by Larry Jeter, who replaced Dan Barnes at catcher for Oregon Tech. Pinch-hitter Jones laid down a bunt along the third-base line that appeared to fans and the Oretech contingent to be foul by a good foot.

But the umpire, a Vancouver cop, called it a fair ball and called Brandon safe when he raced across home plate for the winning run.

**DISAPPEARS**  
Oregon Tech Coach Art Kirkland rushed from the dug-out to dispute the decision but the arbiter disappeared in the crowd before Kirkland could collar him.

Three successive singles by Len Genetin, Querino Lelli and Wayne Paulsen and two costly errors gave the Owls three runs in the ninth.

Then Don Foreman, perched on second base thanks to a two-base bobbie, went to third on a passed ball. The speedy Negro third-baseman stole home for the tying run.

First baseman Jack Brown struck out to end the rally. Oregon Tech scored three in the first inning but Oretech pitcher Don Keaton had a bad opening frame and Clark went ahead to stay in its half of the first with four runners.

**CATCH UP**  
Clark scored seven runs on five hits in the first two innings and Oregon Tech chipped away at the lead, finally catching the Clark nine in the last frame.

Even at that, Keaton struck out 13 batters but the first two innings beat him.

The Owls jumped on two Clark pitchers for 11 hits but were charged with five errors. Clark collected 12 hits off Keaton and committed three errors.

Kirkland will use his left-handed ace, Chuck Tykeson, today against Oregon College in Monmouth.

Yesterday's loss puts Oretech's season record at 2-3. Tykeson owns both wins.

Saturday the Owls jump over to Astoria to play Portland State (Wapport) in the last game of the three-game road campaign.

## LEO SAD, GIANTS LOSE WILLIE MAYS

Seven National League managers were thinking that, well, maybe they could spare a little sympathy for Leo Durocher, the harassed manager of the champion New York Giants. He had lost Monte Irvin and Willie Mays, two-thirds of his regular outfield, and what manager can afford that sort of a blow?

But upon thinking it all over, they went back to feeling sorry for themselves—all except Brooklyn's Chuck Dressen, who still thinks the Dodgers will win the pot.

Not only does Durocher have Bob Elliott to take Irvin's spot, but he has decided to give Dick Wakefield, who has played in just about all four corners of the country, a tryout.

Wakefield has been pounding the ball with authority and has banged out three hits in his four trips to the plate including two in Thursday's 4-0 triumph over the Cleveland Indians.

The Dodgers managed to pull one out of the fire, overcoming the Washington Senators, 4-3, after trailing, 2-0, after three innings. Starter Chris Van Cuyk was the winner.

The Boston Braves' Warren Spahn gave up nine hits, but they were scattered enough to enable his team to decision the Boston Red Sox, 5-4, despite a one-on-one home run by Junior Stephens.

In the only other game between Major League clubs the Philadelphia Phillies nipped the St. Louis Cardinals, 8-7, in a six-inning contest called to permit the teams to catch a train.

Major League teams broke even in four games with Minor League squads. The Philadelphia A's stopped Greensboro of the Carolina League, 9-6, and the Chicago White Sox had to go 10 innings before whipping the Atlanta Crackers of the Southern Association, 10-9.

The World Champion New York Yankees dropped a 6-2 verdict to the Baltimore Orioles of the International League and the Detroit Tigers were trimmed by the Chattanooga Lookouts of the Southern Association, 6-3.

## Odell Changes Style With Heinrich Back

SEATTLE (AP)—The "Arm" is back in Washington football and so is the firecracker style of play that made Howie Odell teams favorites with the fans on two occasions.

Wearing a bright green jersey, All-America Quarterback Don Heinrich—the "Arm"—is pitching passes by the dozen every day in Washington's spring practice program. Watching him, Odell wears a smile as wide as from here to there.

The jersey, contrasting with the dull gray or red worn by other players, makes Don as conspicuous as a pinto horse in a herd of bays. And that's why he wears it—so no tackler will repeat the mistake that put the 1950 All-American on the shelf for the 1951 season.

Don came out of a scrimmage just before the start of the schedule. For a long time it was feared he might never be able to throw again with the deadly accuracy that broke the national passing record in 1950.

A program of weight lifting brought the valuable wing back into top condition. He can throw the long ones and snap the short ones in gross lots without tiring.

With Heinrich in action, Odell is scrapping the split-T formation that time and again left his team hanging on the ropes last year, a few points or a few yards from victory.

He adopted it in midseason of 1950 in an effort to get more punch into his running game. Now he's returning to his own "Odell T"—a whiplash attack that made his teams famous as the Yale "Flying Circus" and the Washington "Red Show."

## HST Has New Glove

CHICAGO (AP)—President Truman will have a new southpaw glove to wear when he tosses out the first ball in the Boston Red Sox-Washington Senators season baseball opener Tuesday.
