## Fire Desroys Hay, Straw

A combination of wind and bon fire destroyed a hay and straw pile on the J. R. Steele ranch yesterday. The breeze whipped sparks from the bonfire into the stack, setting it ablaze.

The county fire wagon made a rapid run to Pine Grove, and with the help of neighbors prevented the blaze from spreading to nearby farm buildings. A bulldozer shoveled the burning material into a nearby field where it smoldered through the night.

## French Raps Concentration

Giles French, Moro, candidate for the Republican nomination for Congress on the primary ballot next month, told members of the Klamath Falls Kiwanis Club yesterday that centralized government, as we have today, is invariably "more expensive and invariably inefficient."

French, an adept statistician, pointed out that Oregon's part in paying the proposed \$5.4 billion dollar national budget for this year would be \$14,000,000 (M), or well over half of the evaluation of the state.

"It's plain to me," he said, "that we will have to put a stop to this."

French is editor of the oft-quoted Sherman County Journal, and has served 17 years in Oregon's legislature.

"The people have given the government the power to do anything with the nation's economy it wants," French said. "They fear another depression."

"But the government with all those controls is more dangerous than the depression. I am certain," he went on, "that the people don't want economic welfare wrapped up in government."

French pointed out that Oregonians can't even be sure how much land they have within the state lines. Different surveys made and figures reported by different agencies aren't the same.

The Bureau of Census figures show Klamath County has 3,822,720 acres. However, French says total figures of forest, public, farm and grazing lands show closer to 5,000,000 (M) acres in the county.

French feels Eastern Oregon's exact size should be surveyed because of its importance.

"Eastern Oregon has 68 per cent of Oregon's area," he said, "and only 16.4 per cent of its people. Yet they pay 21 per cent of the taxes in the state."

The congressional hopeful declared that forests and grazing lands should not be marked off on government records as expenses and therefore liabilities but instead—by cost accounting methods—mark them up as the assets they are.

**SAN FRANCISCO UP** — Full dress negotiations in the seven-state Greyhound bus strike were renewed here Friday.

Omar Hopkins, of the U. S. Conciliation Service, summoned union and company representatives to a joint conference.

Hopkins said "some suggestions" have been advanced for ending the strike of bus drivers which began March 2. He said both sides had considered them separately.

The chief issue in the strike is the union's demand for a five-day week. The company contends it is financially unable to grant this request.
