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Malin Plans Improvements For Community Park Area

One of the Klamath Basin's more popular picnic spots, Malin Community Park is due for extended development if proposals by the Park Board are carried out, and a residential area may be built on what is now some park property.

The park board, consisting of Mike Stasny, Dick Henzel and Emil Polivka, made a tour of Moore Park in Klamath Falls and Ward Park in the suburban area in a survey of concessions and equipment.

Stasny reports the board may install a concession in the near future. More landscaping is also on the planning board.

MORE WORK
Other improvements slated this season include more shrubbery, painting the swimming and wading pools and bath house, and a new children's merry-go-round soon to be installed. A more complete lawn watering system is to be set up.

Twenty of the park's 30 acres have been developed already, but the last 10 acres—on the hill behind the swimming pool—may be platted and sold to private individuals as a residential area. Engineer Bill Wales has already been hired for making a survey of the property, the board has announced.

Eventually the board hopes the Malin corporate limits will be extended to include the proposed new residential area. Funds from the sale of the residential lots will be used for further development of the park.

According to Stasny and Polivka, the board has already been approached by half a dozen individuals who have indicated they would like to build in that district—a district they feel is more than necessary for the park itself.

LANDSCAPER
Tulelake gardener Ed Green, who will landscape the Malin school grounds across the road, has been named to do the additional shrub work in the park. The two jobs will match when completed, the board reported.

Within the park itself, some 20,000 daffodil bulbs have begun spring blooming. The softball field has been revamped, with the diamond moved to a new and better location. A

The German theme "Christ's Victory And Ours" will be presented by Rev. Marvis Koyser.

Special services will also be held Sunday morning in the Church of Christ, with Rev. Glen Vernon in the pulpit, in the Full Gospel Church with Rev. Glen Ayres and in the LDS Church with the service under the direction of Truman Lynch, president.

Oregon Plans New Building

SALEM (AP)—A 20 million dollar building program for Oregon state institutions, which will take ten years to complete, was announced Friday by the State Board of Control.

It will be submitted to the 1953 Legislature.

The board, which began its modernizing program at the institutions six years ago, said it is half completed. It will take the 20 millions to finish it.

Major projects on the list are: Construction of a \$2,500,000 state reformatory in Salem.

Building two more buildings at Fairview Home for feeble-minded persons, including one for babies. A building at the State Hospital for criminally insane persons and sex criminals.

The program includes new construction for all state institutions.

Indian Bureau Workers Fired

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of the Interior Chapman Friday announced suspension from duty and pay of two employees of the Portland, Ore., area office of the Indian Bureau on charges of the sale last year of some Indian timber lands at Gold Beach, Ore.

Chapman identified the employees as Clyde W. Flynn, area land officer in the Portland office, and Francis J. LaFrance, assistant area land officer.

He said in a news release they had been on involuntary annual leave pending an investigation.

The transaction took place Aug. 7, 1951, Chapman said. He related 800 acres of timber land were sold to an Indian woman, Ernestine Simisical, for \$125,000, that on the same day she resold the property to non-Indians for \$160,000.

Then, he continued, the new purchasers sold options for the timber on the land to third parties for \$300,000.

After protests regarding the deal were made to Indian Commissioner Dillon S. Meyer, he brought the matter to Chapman's attention.

The secretary ordered an investigation and had the two employees placed on involuntary annual leave.

Chapman said he expects the investigators' report to be completed this month, "after which final department action will be taken."

At the request of the Interior Department, Chapman said, the Department of Justice has filed suit in federal district court at Portland asking that the land sale be set aside.
