VIRGIN ISLANDS VISITED BY THE NELSON REEDS

Mr. and Mrs. Nelson Reed, 2940 DelMora, recently returned from a most interesting two months trip which included an extended stay in the Virgin Islands.

The colorful islands are located in the Caribbean Sea, east of Puerto Rico and to reach them by boat, one must make reservations months in advance. Because the Reeds did not decide to go until the last of January, they flew from Los Angeles to Miami, stayed overnight and took off for San Juan by Pan American and Caribaire to the island of St. Thomas.

The islands were purchased by the United States from Denmark in 1917 to protect the Panama Canal. There are actually about 100 islands, but only three are large enough to be habitable—St. John, St. Thomas and St. Croix.

Since their discovery by Columbus on his second voyage, the Spanish, French, Dutch, English and Danes have all occupied them and left their mark.

Charlotte Amalie on St. Thomas is the gay, busy, colorful and cosmopolitan capital. Its deep harbor attracts ships from all over the world, just as it did in the pirate days of old.

The products of the world are there for the buying—minus taxes—for it is a tax-free port. Cotton and silk prints from India, Africa and England are available, as well as silver, gems, liquors, liqueurs, cigarettes, leather goods and perumes in a wide variety of brands and types from nearly every country on the face of the earth.

A never-ending source of wonderful surprise to Mrs. Reed was the vast difference in the prices when there are no taxes to pay.

The population of the islands is seventy percent colored, and it is evident that because the sky is a vivid blue, the sea a royal blue—blending to azure—to green, and the flowers are more red or purple or yellow than elsewhere—so are the clothes of the natives. Mrs. Reed said that they mix orange, saffron and cerise in a lot of color in one outfit, topped by a large basket filled with bougainvillea, tomatoes and papayas on their heads—which to even the most fastidious taste the result is utterly charming.

The Reeds found the inhabitants whether white or black, friendly, gracious and helpful.

The colored people are very musical and when their calypso music is played, they start dancing no matter where they may be. In our travelers' opinion "that calypso is pure rhythm and so is the dancing to it."

The temperature of the islands varies from about 77 to 82 degrees with the constantly blowing Trade Winds fanning them, and the ideal climate keeps the numerous hotels filled with tourists from the East and Middle West.

Mr. and Mrs. Reed met several people from San Francisco and a few from Oregon. Mr. and Mrs. Howard Wall of Portland have rebuilt a crumbling castle on St. Croix into a fascinating and charming home. They invited the Reeds to an impromptu cocktail party of about 40 guests, where they met many of the island residents.

In addition to their exciting natural beauty, the Virgin Islands offered many other attractions to the visitors. Swimming is unexcelled, and the very good fishing, boating, yachting, hiking, golf and tennis all made it the perfect vacation.

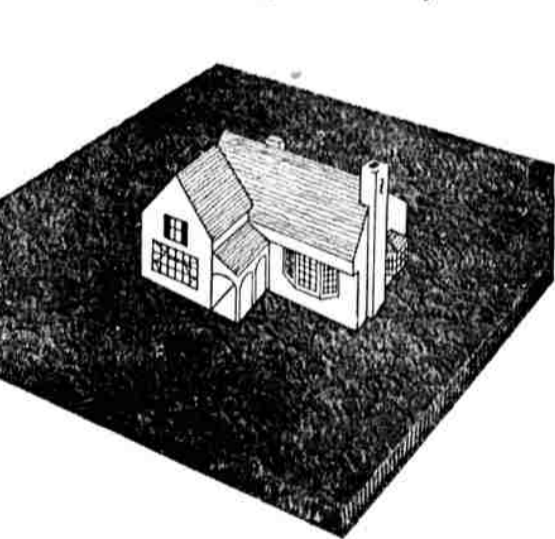
