

TYKESON WINS THIRD

Foreman Hot In OCE Rout

MONMOUTH (Special)—The Oregon Tech Owl, held a 3-3 baseball record today and Southport Chuck Tykeson holds all three wins.

Tykeson, a left-hander from Sherwood, Ore., gave Oregon College of Education just one skippy hit yesterday to win his third decision of the season by an 11-1 count.

Third-baseman Don Foreman led the Owl's onslaught on two OCE pitchers with five hits in six times at bat.

Foreman banged out two doubles and three singles.

Oregon College got its only run in the third inning when Roger Dashi walked, stole second and raced home on Centerfield Bowman's single, the only hit off Tykeson.

Tykeson also got a double for himself, driving in one run in the third inning when the Owl opened scoring with a three-run bing.

Ortech picked up one in the fourth, three more in the fifth and four runs in the eighth in the rout.

Wayne Paulsen got the mightiest blow, a triple in the fifth inning.

Coach Art Kirkling will use Jack Brown against Portland State (Vanport) today. It's the last game of a three-game road swing.

Ex-Pels Star For Beavers

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, (Special)—Klamath Falls has contributed a long line of outstanding athletes to Oregon State, but two brilliant freshmen from the Southern Oregon city show promise of sporting them all. They are John Witte, football and wrestling, and Bill Toole, basketball and track.

Witte, an agile 215 pounder, pulled the unprecedented recently by taking runner-up honors in the national NCAA wrestling tournament at Colorado A. & M. after competing the Pacific coast championship. He finally lost in the finals after a tough bout to a veteran grappler from the University of Minnesota.

The ex-Pelican star also made an outstanding showing as a freshman tackle on the Beaver varsity football team last fall and is rated a sure-fire first string tackle for next season. Line Coach Len Younce says Witte should be one of the top tackles on the coast.

Toole's debut has been almost as auspicious. He made the OSC basketball varsity as a freshman and was generally regarded as the best man in the Northern Division. As soon as he sharpens his shooting eye, he should become one of the best guards in the conference.

HIGH ON TOOLE: At present Toole is a leading candidate for a spot on the OSC varsity track team. He won both the 100 and 220 in the state high school meet last year and also competed in the broad jump and low hurdles for the Beavers. Coach Hal Moore considers him a standout prospect.

Other ex-Pelican athletes who have performed well for the Beavers this year include Bill Mosby, captain of the wrestling team and Pacific coast 167 pound champion; Don Zarosinski, star guard on last fall's football team; Ed Zarosinski, Don's brother and a member of the junior varsity grid club as a freshman; and Bill Harvey, Bill Rose and Ben Shepherd, all members of the varsity wrestling team.

Foe Found for Dick Wolfe

Loes May Prove Good Investment for Bums

If his work this spring is any criterion the Brooklyn Dodgers can write off their investment in Pitcher Billy Loes as "paid in full."

Loes is one of baseball's bonus babies. He received \$21,000 for signing with Brooklyn in 1949 but until this spring has shown little to merit the outlay.

The 22-year-old right-hander spent 1951 in the Army and according to baseball law cannot be shipped to the minors without his consent. Asked recently if he would consent to go to the minors Loes retorted:

"I'm consenting to nothing." Loes' adamant stand may turn out to be a blessing in disguise for Brooklyn.

Manager Chuck Dressen has been impressed by the kid's work. "He might win some games for us," Dressen said. "He's been firing the ball hard since his arm lost

that stiffness and he has a heck of a curve."

Loes strengthened his case Friday as he hurled three hitless and scoreless innings against the world champion New York Yankees in the Yankee Stadium.

Ralph Branca entrusted Loes with an 8-2 lead and the young pitcher showed the Yanks down in order until the ninth when he permitted two walks before retiring the side.

The Dodgers clobbered Rookie Harry Schaeffer and two successors for 14 hits in their 9-2 romp. The Brooks stowed the decision away in the first inning when they clipped Schaeffer for three runs.

Herm Wehner, Hank Perkowski and Frank Smith, almost

turned in the fourth no-hit no-run game of the spring as they teamed up to pitch the Cincinnati Reds to a 5-0, one-hit victory over Detroit at Columbus, Ohio.

DOUBLE: Outfielder Pat Mullin spoiled the bid by cracking a double against Wehner in the second inning.

Robin Roberts tuned up for the season's opener by pitching the Philadelphia Phillies to a 3-2 triumph over their Baltimore Oriole farm hands at Baltimore.

Roberts scattered seven hits and blanked the minor leaguers until the ninth while his mates assembled eight safeties including a three-run homer by Ed Waitkus.

SECOND HIT: The New York Giants nipped the Cleveland Indians, 4-3, in 12-innings at Kansas City. Chuck Diering, weak-hitting outfielder, who entered the game without a hit in 38 trips to the plate, singled home Al Dark from third with the winning run. It was his second hit of the game.

A scheduled game between the White Sox and Cubs at Chicago's Wrigley Field was called off because of cold weather.

Medford Wallops Pelicans

MEDFORD (Special)—Medford staged an eight-run blitz in the second inning yesterday to tie down a 10-1 win over Klamath Falls in a Southern Oregon Conference baseball game.

Medford Pitcher Derald Wootton, who issued just a single, double and triple during his seven-inning stint on the mound, led off the second inning blitz with a triple.

Before the inning was over, Klamath starter Ralph Carroll was relieved on the mound by Fred Friedel—and Medford had eight runs, SIX HITS.

Four hits off Carroll, two off Friedel accounted for the eight runs.

Klamath Falls scored in the seventh and last inning when George (Butcher Boy) Hanson, first baseman, banged a three-bagger and came in when Catcher Ken Young reached first on an error.

Wootton struck out 15, walked two, Carroll gave up four hits—in the second inning rally—and whiffed one, walked three. After Medford reached Friedel for two hits in the big second inning, Freddie settled down and pitched three-hit ball the rest of the way.

TWO MORE: Medford added one run in the fourth, one in the sixth.

Medford scored in the fourth when Terry Maddox doubled and worked home on two errors. Maddox walked in in the sixth inning when he walked, stole second and third and raced in on a wild pitch.
