U.S. Corporal Freed by Reds

WASHINGTON (AP)—An American Army corporal missing behind the Iron Curtain since Dec. 15, 1950, has been returned by Poland to U. S. custody in Germany, the State Department says.

Czech officials said the soldier, Cpl. Alexander Czarniecki of New York, fled into Czechoslovakia because he disagreed with what they called "aggressive policies" of the United States. Czarniecki later was turned over to the Poles.

The State Department Press Officer, Michael J. McDermott said the Polish government permitted Czarniecki to leave Poland Thursday.

Senators Seek Missing Grain

WASHINGTON (AP)—Any government effort to force newspapers to raise advertising rates as a means of discouraging "extravagant" advertising would be censorship, says Sen. Johnson (D-Colo.).

"No matter what other term they used to describe it," he told a reporter, "it's something to true democracy can permit."

"When the government starts to tell the newspapers what kind of advertising and how much of it they can carry, it's moving toward the day when it will seek to control their news columns too."

Johnson specifically denounced a Senate report by a committee headed by Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.) suggesting that newspapers conserve newsprint by having higher rates to discourage "extravagant" advertising. Humphrey said the suggestion was included in the report through a staff error and had been considered by his committee but not approved.

Connally Says Not Running

WASHINGTON (AP)—Tom Connally, the sharp-tongued Democratic senator from Texas, says he "does not desire to be a candidate" for the Senate again.

The wording of Sunday night's announcement touched off speculation whether the 71-year-old head of the Foreign Relations Committee of Ohio State University, who Congress after 23 years, or was testing the sentiment for his continued service.

He is facing what appears to be one of the hardest fights of his 46-year old political career.

Already opposing him in Texas, Attorney General Price Daniel, a popular figure in the Lone Star state.

There is a possibility Gov. Allan Shivers may enter the race, although Shivers said in Austin Sunday night he was still "running for governor."

The name of former Rep. Martin Dies also has been mentioned.

"After long and careful consideration over the months, I have concluded that I do not desire to be a candidate in the primaries in Texas for re-nomination to the United States Senate," said Connally's announcement.

"I have never made a formal announcement of such a candidate. I have never filed any application to have my name placed on the ticket. For these and other reasons of a purely personal character I have not and will not file an application for my name to be placed upon the ticket."

Firm Offers Scholarship

TOKYO (AP)—Marine Capt. Carl S. Detmering, Springfield, Ore., was rescued from the Sea Monday after parachuting from his damaged plane.

An Air Force rescue plane, piloted by Lt. Robert E. Sherwood, Sedalia, Mo., dodged Communist fighters to pick up Detmering. The rescue occurred about 13 minutes after Detmering had landed in the water off a Red-held coast.

52-Death Air Crash Probed

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP)—The Puerto Rican Legislature has launched an investigation of the crash of a Pan American Airways plane here Friday, in which 52 of the 69 persons a board died in the Caribbean.

Congressman Ruben Gastambide, who moved for the investigation, said he had information of criminal negligence in permitting the aircraft to take off on a flight for New York.

A formal hearing by the U.S. Civil Aeronautics Board also will be held.

The plane crashed after one or two of its four engines reportedly failed shortly after it took off.

Searching aircraft Sunday found no trace of the 39 passengers still missing. Thirteen bodies were recovered Friday.

The 17 survivors included the five crewmen headed by the pilot, Capt. John C. Burn, husband of Singer Jane Furnan.

Commiss Use Shock Troops

EASTERN FRONT, Korea (AP)—American soldiers are running into long-haired Communist shock troops, apparently recruited for special missions and guerrilla activities.

The long-haired Reds have appeared along the eastern front in several recent actions. The long locks seem to be a mark of distinction. Koreans traditionally consider long hair such a sign of officers in the North Korean Army. They usually are encountered in groups of four. But one advance Allied Unit believes it was attacked by 100 of the fanatical long-hairs recently.

The long-haired men have been attempting to infiltrate U.S. lines. The Reds have made an obvious effort to recover the bodies killed in these skirmishes but three long-hair bodies have been taken by Allied units.

They showed that the long-hairs were far above the usual standards of front line soldiers. Their clothes appeared freshly cleaned. Their hands were clean and uncalloused—far different from the hands of front soldiers who live roughly.

The long-hairs apparently made their first appearance early this month.

Queen Enjoys Oyster Roast

SEA ISLAND, Ga. (AP)—Queen Juliana of The Netherlands Friday night enjoyed typical Southern hospitality at an oyster roast on an old rice plantation in what was described as a "Gone with the Wind" setting.

A full moon glowed over great oak trees bedecked with Spanish moss at the Allamania plantation owned by Alfred Jones, chairman of the board of the swank Clister Hotel.

Negro plantation workers, descendants of slaves, sang spirituals and were later introduced to the Queen.

The plantation is about 25 miles from the beach cottage on the grounds of the Clister Hotel where the Queen and her husband, Prince Bernhard, are interrupting their six-day visit during the Easter week-end.
