Plane Crash Injures Three

Three Lakeview residents escaped with minor hurts Sunday afternoon in the crash of a light plane on the highway a quarter-mile south of Valley Falls. The pilot and owner of the 1949 Piper Cub, Joseph M. Jakick, suffered a break on his right arm above the wrist. Eldon Stewart, Lakeview jeweler, received face lacerations and his son Jimmy was bruised.

Jakick and his passengers had flown to Paisley from Lakeview on a dinner hop, in company with three other planes. They were coming back when trouble developed and caused them to try to make a landing in a plowed field.

But plane struck a fence post and crashed into the highway. Myron Buswell, manager of the Lakeview airport, said the cause of the crash was not definitely known, but might be attributed to squally weather, restricted visibility and possible carburetor icing.
