

Pels Set Rogue Broad Jump Mark

Klamath Third In Relays

Three new meet records were set here by Klamath Falls Saturday as the Pelicans finished third behind Medford and Grants Pass in the five-team Rogue Relays on the Medford track.

Medford finished with 647, Grants Pass 62, Klamath Falls 407, Crater 31 and Ashland 14 in a meet that wasn't decided until the final event, the high jump relay, won by Medford.

Dean Gordy, Jim Dougherty and Dick Abraham, two sophomores and a freshman, was the Pelican broad-jump team that established a new record of 58 feet 6 1/2 inches. That effort bettered Medford's old mark of 57 feet 10 1/2 inches.

Gordy leaped 19 feet, Dougherty 19.7 and Abraham 19.1.

Medford broke the other two records in the shot and discus and the mile relay.

COMBINE

The Mock-Judd-Bingham combine put together a 130-foot 7-inch mark in the weight event, bettering Klamath Falls' old record of 128 feet 3 inches.

Davis, Kittle, Lambquist and Don Spinas, running in that order, paced through a 3:33.3 mile relay, shing Medford's own mark of 3:35.5. This was probably the outstanding feat of the meet, just as the results of a second of the Hayward Relay record.

Klamath Falls also won the distance medley. The Pelican quartet stepped off an 11:39.9 race with Tom Wells running the three-quarter mile, Clinton Mills the quarter mile, Harold Summers the half mile and Harry Pitts the mile in that order.

OTHER PLACES

Other Klamath Falls placers were third in the 400-yard relay, Greg Schulte, third in the discus, fourth in the shot put relay, Jerry Johnson, a tie for second in the pole vault, Steve Chaffold, second in the javelin, third in the 360-yard shuttle hurdles, and third in the mile relay.

The discus, pole vault and javelin were single events, based on individual efforts. The other nine events were relay events.

Major Leagues Roll Tomorrow

NEW YORK (AP) Major League ball clubs will lead with their pitching arms Tuesday when the 1952 baseball season gets underway but the lineups otherwise will be dotted with new faces.

In New York, Sal Maglie (23-4), Giants ace, will oppose Robin Roberts (21-15), Philadelphia's best. The Giants, however, will present a couple of new faces in second baseman Davey Williams and left fielder Bob Elliott. Williams succeeded the scrappy Eddie Stanky, Elliott was obtained from the Braves as an 11th round pick for the injured Monte Irvin.

Boston fans will see a flock of newcomers in the lineup when the Braves' Warren Spahn (22-14) faces the Brooklyn Dodgers' Preacher Roe (22-2), second baseman Billy Reed, shortstop Jack Custick and third baseman Ed Mathews will appear in starting roles.

ROOKIES

The St. Louis Cardinals may use Rookie Steve Billea at first against Pittsburgh when Gerry Staley (19-13) takes the mound against the Pirates' Murry Dickson (20-16).

The Braves will counter with some rookies of their own in infielders Dick Hall and Jimmy Merson and outfielder Bobby Del Greco.

Veteran righthander Bob Rush (11-12) of the Reds will be on the mound in the Chicago-Cincinnati game which may feature the debut of outfielder Wally Post of the Reds and Catcher Tony Atwell of the Cubs.

The Dodgers will field the same team that lost the pennant in a playoff with the Giants last year.

Jim Frisley, hard-hitting young outfielder, may be in the Cleveland lineup when the Indians, with Early Wynn (20-13) on the mound, tackle the Chicago White Sox. Lefty Billy Pierce (15-14) will pitch for the Sox who will show their home town fans new faces in third baseman Hector Rodriguez and Catcher Sherman Lollar.

NEW FACES

Lou Boudreau, confronted with the loss of Ted Williams, is grooming a couple of young hard-hitting outfielders and may start newcomers Fave Throneberry and Gene Stephens when Boston faces the Senators in Washington. Mel Parnell (18-11) will hurl against the Nats' Bob Porterfield (9-8).

Manager Rogers Hornsby, back at the managerial helm, will feature a new team except for Pitcher Ned Garver (20-12) when the Browns oppose Dizzy Trout (9-14) and the Tigers in Detroit.
