RULE CHANGE ROBS SNEAD OF VICTORY

GREENSBORO, N. C. (AP) Dave Douglas squeezed through an opening supplied by golf's blue book to turn what looked certain to be Sam Snead's fifth Greensboro Open Tournament victory into a \$2,000 Douglas payday.

Douglas of Newark, Del., came home with a 69 for a winning seven-under-par 277 Monday, but it was almost a half hour before it was official.

Snead, winner here four times, appeared a sure winner as he took the lead through 63 holes and shook off Art Wall Jr., the 54-hole leader. Then Sammy put his tee shot in a lateral water hazard. He dropped it out, taking a stroke there, and eventually holed out in five strokes. But, Bobby Locke, the South African ace, and Ed (Porky) Oliver, Lemont, Ill., who played with him, told Sam he erred in dropping the ball closer to the hole. This is a new 1952 rules change defining such a situation of which Snead apparently was unaware.

PGA Tournament Supervisor Frank Gaywood charged Snead with a two-stroke penalty for his lapse under the new rule. That gave Sam a seven and his birdie four on the 18th hole meant only three—way for the third with Oliver and Jim Ferrier, San Francisco.

Locke grabbed clubhouse money of \$1,400 with his 70 to finish for 278. Snead, Oliver, and Ferrier, each received \$846.66.

At Zionsville, Portland, Ore., finished in a tie for 20th with 287 good for \$95.

Robinson Heavily Favored

CHICAGO (AP) — Ray Robinson's middleweight title defense against Mauler Rocky Graziano Wednesday night is expected to be a savage slugfest that will fall far short of going the scheduled 15 round distance.

Most observers believe the brawl will either be stopped by the referee for a TKO or end in a 16-count knockout before the 10th round is reached.

The only surprise, they say, would be a Graziano victory.

Champion Sugar Ray is heavily backed to ring up his 131st professional win and score his 86th knockout since he flashed out of the amateur ranks as a 20-year-old sensation in 1940.

The prospect of an action-packed scrap, carrying somewhat the aura of brutality and blood-splilling of a bull fight, may lure more than 19,000 customers to Chicago stadium.
