A Circuit Court \$10,000 damage suit went into its second day this morning with hearing of testimony by the plaintiff Mrs. Jane Shiel.

Defendant in the case, Consumer Heating Co., is accused with negligence in an accident Aug. 20, 1948, from which Mrs. Shiel claims injury.

The complaint charges negligence in maintenance of a tank walk over construction at 7th and Main Sts. where the defendant company was doing work to underground pipes. Mrs. Shiel claimed injury when she fell into an open ditch.

## Aircraft Tax Due April 30

April 30 is the deadline for registration of private aircraft to avoid having them taxed as personal property.

State law stipulates that private planes may be registered with and licensed by the State Board of Aeronautics in lieu of personal property assessment.

The registration cost is based on the weight of the plane, 2,000 pounds and under \$5, over 2,000 pounds \$10.

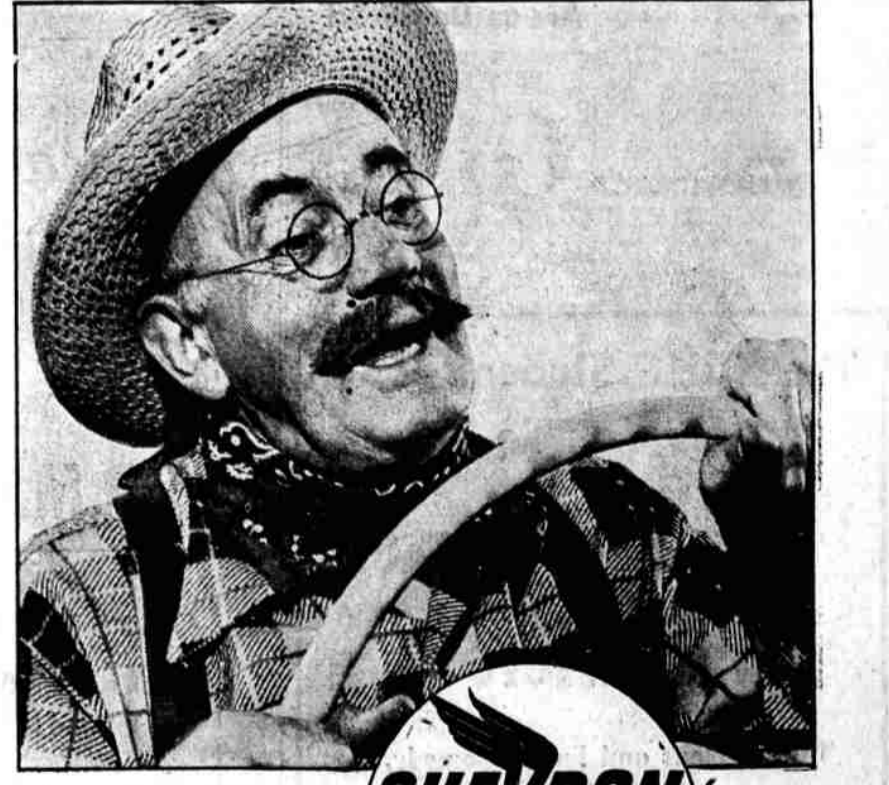
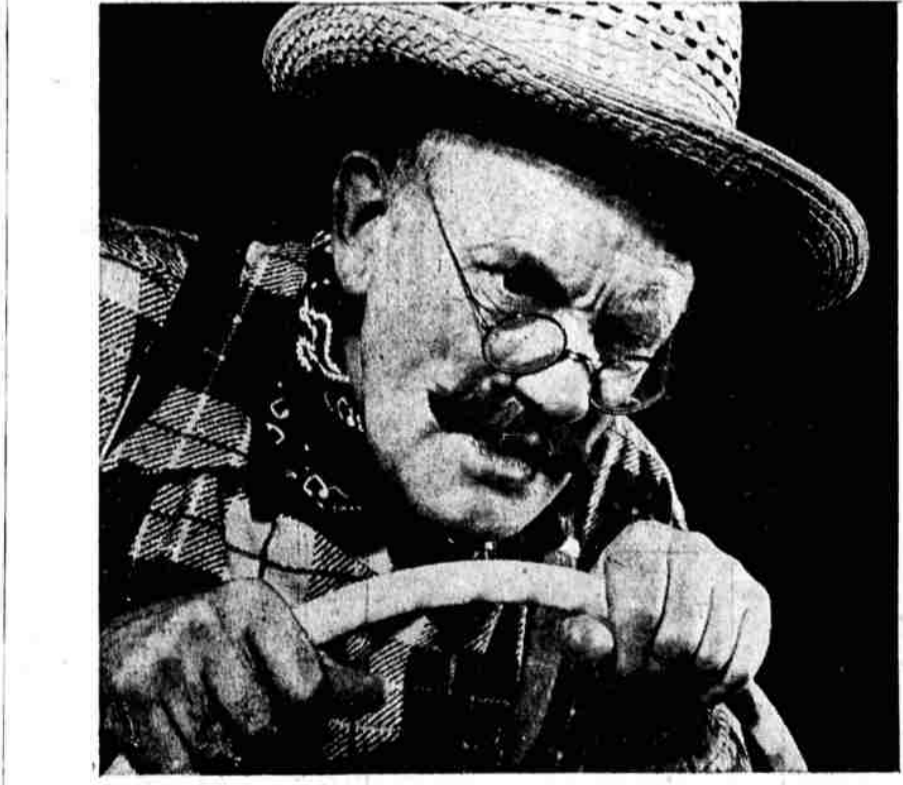
