Easter Day Is Symbol Life Says Pastor

Make Your Girdles Last Cinch Figger Clean Binder

If you're one of the thousands of women who complain that their girdles just aren't lasting long enough, then take note: you're probably not babying your basics enough!

From the designer of one of the country's leading foundation houses comes the word that the days of rough handling ought to be over. And from the average budget these days, comes the warning that most of us just can't afford to mistreat our foundations.

Some women think that the longer they can go without washing their foundations . . . the longer they will last. Actually nothing could be farther from the truth. Dirt, oils, and even perspiration cause the elastic in girdles to discolor, to lose its shape and to deteriorate. Sun-tan lotion, for instance, is one of the most destructive of take care of your girdles this summer to wash off all traces before donning your foundation.

A sudsing for girdles and bras after every two wearings at least depending, of course, on the length of wearing, is recommended.

Washing the garment can sometimes assume the proportions of a real melodrama, and the effects are certainly tragic. Hot water, harsh soaps or detergents, irons, radiators, and a firm hand are the villains of the piece.

There's really no secret to caring for your foundation garment. Here are some do's and don'ts to remember: Do . . . be sure that all zippers and closings are fastened before washing. Do . . . soak the garments in warm, mild soap-suds for about seven minutes. If you must use a washing machine, be sure your foundations are in a cheese cloth bag, and that the water is not too hot.

Do . . . rinse your girdles thoroughly and roll in a towel so that excess moisture is absorbed. Don't . . . hang up your girdle with clothes pins. Close the garters over a hanger.

Do . . . dry it naturally away from the heat or direct sunlight. Do . . . iron the fabric sections of the garment. Don't . . . iron the nylon or elastic.

After all the controversy about the dangers of detergents, researchers have proved that although they have a tendency to take the enamel off metal, if handled carefully, they do not harm elastic.

But all the care in the world won't make one girdle carry the burden of a second skin. When fashion experts talk about choosing a wardrobe of foundation garments, they're not talking to the woman with a champagne pocket. They're talking to the average woman who dresses herself and her family on a very strict budget.

From the practical point of view, having a wardrobe of foundation garments actually cost less. Alternate wear of about three girdles and four bras saves continuous wear and tear on just one. It leaves plenty of time for natural drying, and for the necessary re-

pairs that assure garments a longer life.

Delicate care of the most basic part of a woman's costume is not just good economy. A well bred girdle says a lot about the femininity of the woman who wears it.
