Chamber Raps Steel Action

The board of directors of the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce Wednesday voted to send a message of protest of President Truman's seizure of the steel mills to Washington, and also to ask Chamber of Commerce members to write to Congressmen expressing views on the subject.

The action came after a resolution of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce condemning the steel seizure as a "dictator-like usurpation of power" was read.

The next Chamber of Commerce bulletin will contain a request that all members write to Congressmen giving their thoughts on the subject.

Action of the Wage Stabilization Board in recommending the union shop for the steel industry was also attacked in the Los Angeles resolution, and reiterated by the local organization.

The feeling was that the stabilization agency was trying to force the union shop on the steel industry, and it is a tampering with the personal freedom and rights of both the industry and its workers.

Ben Goddard, attorney, was elected to fill a vacancy on the board of directors, and two other vacancies exist. Nominations to fill those posts will be received at the board's next meeting.
