Although Defeating Champion Klamath Falls, can't be handed the favored role in tomorrow's 15th annual Hayward Relays at Eugene, there are 22 Pelican thinclads primed for the season's biggest upset.

And upset it would be, even more so than last year, when the Pelicans edged Medford by one-third of a point, 58 1/2 to 58.

Last year the Pelicans were lounded with veterans, although not involved in the annual classic staged on the University of Oregon track.

This year the Pelican crew is loaded top with sophomores and freshmen and Coach Paul Deiler freely admits "it's a building year."

Probably the center of attention Pelicanwise is centered on two sophomores and a freshman—Dean Gordy, Jim Dougherty and Dick Abraham—who broke the Rogue Relay broad jump record last week in Medford with a combined leap of 58 feet, 6 1/2 inches.

This is almost three feet short of the Hayward record of 61-1 but the three Pelican youngsters must be given at least an outside chance of winning the event.

A Jefferson broad jump team added up 59-4 1/2 in the Portland Relays.

There's local hope riding on the shoulders of the Klamath Falls distance medley quartet of Don Wells, Clinton Mills, Harold Simmers and Barry Pitts.

These four raced the 1230-440-880-mile parley in 11:39.9 to cop the blue ribbon in the Rogue Relays. The Hayward record is 11:05.4.

Pads Cop PCL Lead; Ports Win

Those pesky Padres of San Diego perched atop the Pacific Coast League standings Friday hoping to make it three in a row over the San Francisco Seals.

Thursday night must have been sweet indeed for San Diego Manager Lefty O'Doul, who was fired last year after 17 seasons at the San Francisco helm. Not only did his new charges beat the Seals, 10-6, but the victory lifted them into first place ahead of the Los Angeles Angels, who've gripped the top spot since the opening series.

Seattle dropped the Angels one-half game behind the Padres with a 4-1 setback while Hollywood nudged Sacramento's six-game win streak to 11 and Portland dumped Oakland 8-3. The same foes square off Friday night.

San Diego's victory, paced by First Baseman Jack Graham, a perfect night at bat, lowered San Francisco into a three-way third place tie with Sacramento and Portland, all four games behind the leader.

Graham laced a triple, double, single and drew a pair of walks. His three-bagger in the third started a four-run rally that broke a 4-4 deadlock. Keith Bowman, rookie who hurried for Tacoma, Wash., and Bakestiel, Calif., last season, was the winning pitcher.

At Seattle, the Rainiers were behind six-hit pitching by Vern Kindersfather who beat the Angels' Bill Moisan. Seattle tallied six runs in the first two innings. Al Lyons tripled in the first and George Vico's double in the second were the telling blows. Moisan knocked in the only Los Angeles run with a fifth inning double.

Round trip blasts by Jim Russell and Joe Brovia helped Portland make it three straight over Oakland. Rookie Gilbert hit a circuit-clout for the losers.
