Money Savers Face Problem

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senators intent on budget slashing faced the possibility Friday that the first big money bill passed by the Senate this session may be higher than the House version.

The final total of the catch-all \$60 million dollar appropriation bill now before the Senate will depend on amendments still to be acted on.

But in the first round of voting Thursday, the Senate boosted the total by about 9 1/2 million dollars. And some amendments could push it even higher. Others call for cuts.

The measure, as it came from the Senate Appropriations Committee, provided \$60,641,838 to supplement funds previously voted various government agencies for the fiscal year ending June 30.

This compared with a total of \$68,127,943 as the bill passed the House and with budget requests of \$1,061,954,520.

The Senate voted Thursday to add nine million dollars to start paying off claims of U. S. citizens of Japanese ancestry evacuated from the West Coast during World War II.

Red Cross Aids Flood Headaches

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Ia. (AP)—There were plenty of headaches after long hours on the Missouri River levees, and one foreman told Amateur Radio Operator Joe Cornell to send out a call for 100 aspirins.

"I put out a call to the Red Cross for 200—just hoping for a hundred," Joe related Thursday night.

"The next thing I knew, the Red Cross sent a thousand aspirins and a doctor to administer them. They figured there must be something seriously wrong whenever so many aspirins were wanted."

Ridgway Honors Ernie Pyle

TOKYO (AP)—Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway Friday paid tribute to Ernie Pyle as "the most beloved war correspondent of World War II."

Ridgway issued a statement for use in memorial services on Ie Shima, where Pyle was killed April 1, 1945, by a Japanese sniper.

Pyle was shot while covering the advance of the U. S. 7th Infantry Division on the little island near Okinawa.

Dutch Smoker Wins Crown

FLINT, Mich. (AP)—A 77-year-old Dutchman won out with smoke rings to spare in an unofficial contest for the world's pipe smoking championship.

Nico Klazinga of Purmerend, Holland, made his 3.3 grams of burley tobacco last 92 minutes and 18 seconds Thursday, bettering the world record by nearly four minutes.

Putting away at the same time in his pipe shop window here, Paul Spanuola, 38, got only 43 minutes worth out of his 3.3 grams.

It was Spanuola's world record of 43 minutes and 18 seconds that the Dutchman beat while smoking in his native Holland. But his time won't be recognized officially because it was not set at a convention of pipe smokers.

The two men compared times by Transatlantic telephone after completing their smoking stints.

Cop's Arrest Riles Mayor

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—Mayor John Chaff has ordered police from Oklahoma City to stop arresting citizens of his incorporated suburban town of Village, Okla.

Chaff ordered his town marshal Thursday night to arrest any officer of another municipality who "violates the peace and sanctity" of Village residents. The town adjoins Oklahoma City on the north.

His action followed the arrest of a villager Wednesday by two Oklahoma City policemen.

Delmar Eugene Bellow was held on a charge of failing to pay three overtime parking tickets. He was detained more than an hour when police refused to accept his \$60 check for bond.

The mayor has no fear violators of his ban on outside police will get short shrift in court. He is also the police judge.

Sabres Battle Commie Jets

SEOUL (AP)—Communist MIG jets streaked south from their Manchurian bases Friday and tangled with U. S. Sabre jets in six battles high over North Korea.

The U. S. Fifth Air Force said one Red jet was shot down and three were damaged. Saturday reports Allied losses, if any, are reported weekly.

One MIG was shot down and two were damaged in one of five morning battles which matched a total of 70 Sabres against 58 Russian-type MIGs.

The third MIG was damaged in an afternoon dogfight involving 50 Sabres and about 60 MIGs.

On the ground, Communist patrols continued to feel out United Nations defenses. They concentrated on the western and central fronts.

Intermittent enemy artillery fell Friday along sectors west of the Pukhan River in the center of the line, where the main Red probes were made.

An Eighth Army staff officer said the Communists had been observed digging in along ridges fronting Allied positions in the central front. Reinforcements were moved in to strengthen the U. N. lines.

POW Exchange Parley Slated

MUNSAN (AP)—Allied and Communist staff officers, after a two week recess, Saturday reopen off-the-record talks on how to exchange prisoners of the Korean war.

There was no indication whether a break was imminent in the long deadlock over the Allied demand for voluntary repatriation.

Some observers, however, indicated a compromise formula was in the works. Both sides were believed to have spent the past two weeks overhauling prisoner rosters and bringing them up to date.

The UN Command said it was ready for another try to break the deadlock. The Communists had pressed twice for speedy resumption of the secret talks.

Wire Tap Held Cause of Fire

TOKYO (AP)—Police Friday blamed Tottori's disastrous \$41,500,000 fire on a short circuit caused by illegal tapping of electric wires. They jailed three suspects.

The 12-hour fire left 25,000 homeless and injured 120 persons, but no one was killed. An estimated 5,000 homes were destroyed.

The government allotted \$1,100,000 to help rebuild the southwestern Honshu Island city of 61,000. And additional \$69,000 will be spent on temporary shelters.

The fire was the worst in Japan since World War II and was officially described as the third largest since 1926.

Jail Outbreak Thwarted

ELKHART Ind. (AP)—Fearing an outbreak in the Elkhart county jail, police Thursday sent home prisoner David E. McNeil, 18.

McNeil, booked for investigation in several auto thefts, was getting the mumps.
