Editor Wins Court Trial

LAKE CHARLES, La. (AP)—Managing Editor Kenneth Dixon of the Lake Charles American Press, was acquitted Friday on charges of defaming the Calcasieu Parish (county) district attorney, assistant district attorney and the 13 members of the parish police jury.

Judge Bernard Coker read a lengthy opinion on the one charge against the managing editor and concluded that Dixon had the right to criticize the officials during his editorial campaign against gambling.

Dixon's indictment was based on an editorial he wrote entitled "Legal double talk."

In the editorial he criticized the police jury for declining to pass a resolution calling for gambling law enforcement.

He criticized Assistant District Attorney Melvin Wetherill for an opinion Wetherill gave the police jury advising it not to pass the resolution.

Dixon was one of five newspapermen indicted for defamation of public officials and three admitted gamblers during the newspapers' crusade against wide open gambling in Calcasieu Parish.

Dixon's verdict was the first returned by Judge Coker Friday.

The others were to follow later Friday.

Other newspapermen indicted were publisher Thomas Shearman; his son, co-publisher Hugh Shearman; city editor James Norton; and reporter Carter George.

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Phony Upsets, OSC Election

CORVALLIS (AP)—After a student body election, Oregon State College learned Thursday that one of the candidates for president didn't even exist.

Hastily, the student senate cancelled the election. Another will be held Wednesday.

It all came about because pranksters thought they could prove students had little real interest in study body elections, the campus newspaper said it had learned.

So they started a petition to nominate a Dick Hastings for president. They induced the present study body president, senior class president, and various other student officials to sign a nominating petition for Hastings.

They explained his absence at a later meeting by saying he was home with his sick mother.

But after the election, it all came out. There is no Dick Hastings enrolled here.

How many votes Hastings got was not announced, for results of the election were not disclosed.

Air Lines May Be Excluded

PENDLETON (AP)—Pendleton is about ready to go ahead and build its new airport building without United Air Lines.

There will be no space for the air line in the building that the City Council proposes to erect. The council told the city manager to submit the plans for approval of the Civil Aeronautics Administration.

The council decided United Air Lines had delayed too long in transferring title of an airport building to the city. That title has not yet been transferred. The council feared the delay would upset its plans to get federal building funds.

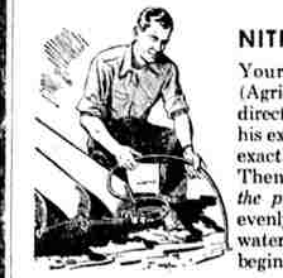
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
