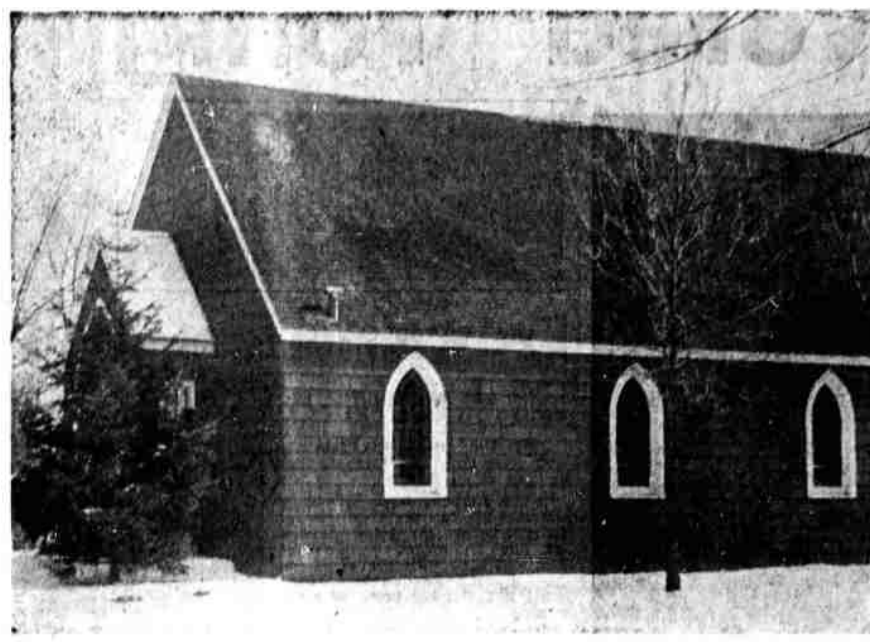

## First Congregational Now In 'Growing Pain' Stage

(Editor's note: This is the first weekly church page series on the history of churches in Klamath Falls. Credit is given to Mrs. Hal Ogle who has prepared background material and photographs for the series.)

Klamath Falls First Congregational Church is currently experiencing growing pains, and as many other organizations of its nature, has gone through the periods of hard times to reach that stage.

Records of the church show its work budding here in 1926 under leadership of Rev. Nelson F. Cole, its first pastor. The first church building was a house on Wantland. But in 1930 property was bought for the present Garden Ave. location.

The year 1930 found difficult financial straits, but men of the congregation, including those who were unemployed, banded together to volunteer many hours of free labor toward construction of a new church building.

Actually first labors of the Congregational Church Building Society were begun in this area in 1895. Three years later, however, the work was turned over to the Methodists and not until 1926 did a Congregational minister come here to begin the work again.

Three charter members of that first church (in 1926) are still living in Klamath Falls. They are Albert F. Jones, 346 Division St., Mrs. M. A. Carter, 1919 Lowell St., and Dr. A. A. Soule, 1945 Main St.

First officers of the church were A. A. Soule, F. R. Vance and A. F. Jones, trustees; T. N. Case and Rev. J. W. Bryant, deacons; Mrs. E. L. French, clerk and Mrs. K. D. Jones, treasurer.

In the life of most every organization or community there is always a fire to mark a certain point in its history. The First Congregational minister came here to begin the work again.

**WOOL SUPPLY DOWN**  
SYDNEY — Australia's wool selling season has been curtailed because production is at least 160,000 bales below estimates.

The National Council of Wool selling brokers had budgeted for 3,600,000 bales being auctioned. This has been revised to 3,440,000 bales, and further reduction may be made.

A series of sales has been cancelled at Sydney and Brisbane.

The 40-voice group is under direction of Director Clyde Keutzer.

## State Pay Hike Recommended

SALEM — The State Civil Service Commission Thursday recommended pay increases averaging 4.7 per cent for Oregon state employees.

The proposed increases would cost the state \$1,800,000 annually, James M. Clinton, civil service director, said. The recommendation is based on a survey of comparable jobs in private industry and the increased cost of living. The survey was authorized by the State Emergency Board last January.

A public hearing on the proposal will be held April 28, Clinton said.

## Snow Threatens More Floods

WASHINGTON — The Agriculture Department reported Friday that record breaking snow packs in the western half of the continent threaten to flood streams other than the already rampaging Missouri River.

This prospect is based on recent measurement of snow covers in a dozen western states and British Columbia.

The runoff of water from melting snow in California, for example, is expected to be the greatest since the government started making snow surveys there 22 years ago.
