Merrill—March was a busy month of entertainment for the Merrill Cub Scouts. On March 21, they held a night den meeting and parents and friends visited.

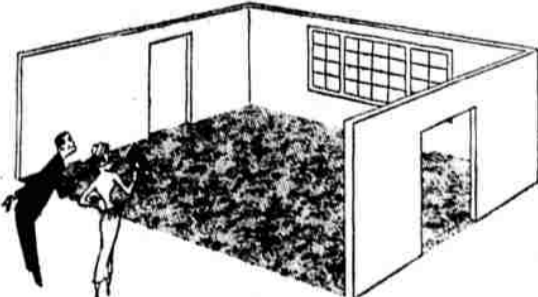
Field Scout executive Don Adams presented the chapter to the pack March 27 Mr. Morgan of the
