## Girl Rescues Boy in Water

TENNANT—Sharon Murphy, 13-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Archie Murphy, recently saved the life of a 7-year-old boy who had fallen into a lake near Sheeta Dam.

Several persons from Tennant, including Mr. and Mrs. Ken Treator and daughter Sandra; Mr. and Mrs. Dick Hatfield and Mrs. Hazel Mooney; Donald and Michael Mooney and Sharon were attending a family reunion at the community of Lake Sore.

While the families were exchanging greetings, the children ran to the lake and little David White, son of Mr. and Mrs. Burris White, Lake County, Calif., fell into the 50-foot water.

Sharon dived in and after groping with debris under water finally grabbed the youngster, held his face above the surface and swam to shore where other children were able to pull them out.

Little David contributed to the saving of his own life by having presence of mind enough to hold his nose while under water.

Sharon had learned to swim at Yreka last summer.

## Infant Aided Second Time

City firemen late Saturday afternoon were called back to the Nick Yoro residence, 139 Uerlings, where a two-month-old baby was strangling on milk.

This is a repeat call for a similar incident the night before when firemen revived the child without use of a respirator.

However, the baby was taken to the hospital Saturday.

Flames from burning debris at the site of last summer's big Exuma Box Co. fire on South Sixth Street brought out firemen again Saturday afternoon.

The flames were blazing dangerously near the SP ice dock, but firemen report they were cooled down and no damage was caused.

## German Blast Fatal to 13

BERLIN (AP)—A coal mine explosion behind the Iron Curtain in East Germany has killed at least 13 miners and injured 27. An undisclosed number of miners are listed as missing.

An official statement by the East German government said the blast Saturday was in a shaft of a hard coal mine in Zwickau in Southern Saxony, an area closed to Westerners.

The announcement was the first of its kind to come from the Communist government although it is known that copper and uranium mines have exploded in the East. This fact led to speculation that the latest disaster was so great it was felt it could not be kept secret.

State security police, who normally investigate political matters—including sabotage, have been called to seek the cause of the explosion.

Some East Zone coal pits work as many as 500 men each. Conditions in many are primitive and dangerous because the Russians stripped them of much equipment as reparations just after the war.

## German Rites Held Today

Funeral services were held today in Colton for Thomas Frigaard, 75, father of Mrs. Dick Reeder, Klamath Falls. Mr. Frigaard, 75, died at the family home late Friday following a stroke two months ago. He had been a resident of Colton for 40 years. He was born in Norway and came to this country in 1906.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Ellen Frigaard, Colton; two sons, Conrad Frigaard, Salem and Ollie Frigaard, New York, who is living West for the funeral; one daughter, Mrs. Dick (Aasodt) Reeder; also several grandchildren.

Mr. and Mrs. Reeder and family went north for the funeral and will return home tonight.

## Credit Bars Going Down?

WASHINGTON (AP)—An end to government control over installment buying is expected soon, informed officials say.

This would mean that there would no longer be any federal regulations on how much you would have to pay down on automobiles, radio and television sets, refrigerators, furniture and other items.

And, too, there would be no limit on how long—or short—a time you would get to pay back your loans.

The officials pointed out, however, there is no move afoot to end government regulations involving down payments and mortgages on houses.

These officials said the Federal Reserve Board is ready to suspend controls on installment buying of consumer goods as soon as it learns what Congress is going to do about control powers.

Two major reasons for an early end to the regulations were cited: (A) A removal of the restrictions might act as a stimulant to lagging sales and (B) inflationary forces have subsided, for the present, at least.

## THOUSANDS HOMELESS

SAIGON, Indochina (AP)—Fire destroyed 1,500 straw huts at the edge of Saigon Monday, leaving 10,000 persons homeless. The blaze started when a bottle of gasoline was accidentally dropped and caught fire.

## City Ballot Study Slated

The various city measures on the Klamath Falls May 10 ballot will be discussed by the League of Women Voters Wednesday at a 12:30 p.m. Wednesday meeting at the Pelican party room.

"The Citizen's View of '52," a forum sponsored by the League of Women Voters, Life Magazine and the National Broadcasting Company will be presented. In this activity local members may mark ballots choosing questions to be put to presidential candidates at the League's national convention to be held May 1 in Cincinnati.

Wednesday's meeting will be conducted by Mr. Fred Karlson, voters service chairman, with Mrs. John Yador co-chairman.

## Experts Probe Death Crash

LOS ANGELES (AP)—While deputy county coroners continued their grisly task of attempting to complete identification of 29 plane crash victims, aviation experts Monday tried to determine cause of Friday's airliner disaster.

Ralph Reed, deputy chief of the Civil Aeronautics Board, and his assistants were rechecking parts of the smashed C-46 non-scheduled North Continent Airlines plane.

Later a public hearing on the crash will be held.

Reed said he didn't give much weight to a possible heart attack of the pilot as a crash cause. He said it was logical the co-pilot would take over if the pilot were stricken.

Saturday, a county autopsy surgeon said he found post mortem evidence that the dead pilot, Lewis Powell, 44, of La Crescenta, Calif., suffered from heart disease.

The coroner's office said 28 bodies and parts of a 29th have been recovered. Only 21 have been identified.

## British Clocks Set Ahead

LONDON (AP)—Britons have set their clocks ahead one hour for the summer.

The change which went into effect Sunday, puts the time in England nine hours ahead of Pacific standard time in the United States, instead of eight. English time is now the same as in France, Italy and Germany. They made no summer change.

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## Taxi Firms Hike Rates

Klamath taxi services have announced an increase in their rates. The reason, they explain, is because of the continuing increase in costs and expenses.

A "30-cent zone" in close to the downtown area has been shortened, while most other zones have increased by 25 cents.

Trips to the airport have been upped 50 cents.

One cab service manager said this is the first increase in cab prices in about 10 years. He said costs of gasoline, parts and equipment have mounted in recent years, as well as the labor expenses.

The city franchise, he said, has doubled in the past decade.
