### Music While Shopping In New Super Market

All the newest angles in customer service will meet the public eye Friday in the remodeled Safeway store at 8th and High Sts. According to Harold Johnson, district manager from Medford, handling of customers will be speeded with addition of two more checkout stands, bringing the total to six. Parkin' facilities will be doubled with property attained on the corner of 8th and High Sts. Interior of the store from floor to ceiling has been entirely done over in less than three weeks. Subcontracting work was done by Klamath Falls firms.

New to Safeway stores here, but not other retail outlets in Oregon, will be a self-service meat counter running the width of the store at the rear. Packaged meats will be cut daily and kept in the refrigerated counter. The spic and span cutting room, according to Johnson will be kept at an even temperature of 50 to 60 degrees. Coolness and calmness will be other new features of the store, with air conditioning provided from ceiling units and music broadcast through speakers connected to an automatic record machine. Refrigerated containers have

been provided for fruits and vegetables, dairy products, ice creams, and special lines of cheeses. Other new items added include overhead fluorescent lighting, large display counters enabling handling of more products, and even new chrome shopping buggies. New faces will also be added to the store staff as result of the remodeling.

Dist. Mr. Johnson said the store's staff will be doubled. Art Nordquist is manager of the new store.

### 'Copter Saves Trio in River

SAN FRANCISCO — A giant Coast Guard helicopter plucked a critically sick man and two companions from a river sandbar 20 miles north of the California-Oregon border late Tuesday.

The helicopter completed the 300-mile rescue flight from the Coast Guard air base here by landing the ill man, Jun Violet, 57, of Smith River, Calif., at Crescent City, Calif. He was hospitalized there for what was diagnosed as a thyroid attack, the Coast Guard reported.

Violet and his companions, Ross Horn, Brookings, Ore., and a man identified only as "Pinky," were fishing on Oregon's Chetco River when Violet was stricken.

They beached their boat. A game warden got word through to the Coast Guard and the HO-4S helicopter, capable of carrying 10 men, was dispatched.

### Washington Has Crime Increase

WASHINGTON — Washington State had the sharpest crime increase on the Pacific Coast in 1951, the Federal Bureau of Investigation reported Monday, but the Oregon picture was slightly brighter.

The annual FBI report covering seven major crimes showed Oregon was the only coastal state to have less crime than in 1950. The agency said 34 Washington cities reported 29,417 cases during the year, compared to 27,510 in the previous 12 months. In Oregon, 26 cities had 13,823 crime reports as against 13,818 in 1950.

Fifty-foot poles brought from 29 1/2 to 28 cents a lineal foot 100-foot poles 45 cents a foot.
