Malin Wins Byrne Beats Indians

Brownie Cuts Win Streak

By The Associated Press You might say the St. Louis Browns "Byrne up" the Cleveland Indians.

Tommy Byrne, the ex-Yankee wildman, who found control on the banks of the muddy Mississippi, can't stand to see the Tribe on a winning war dance.

Last August the Indians came to St. Louis with a wampum string of 13 straight wins. Along came Byrne. And then there was none.

Tuesday night the Indians brought a near-record seven game win streak to town. Once again Mr. Byrne got out his old left-handed tomahawk. No record. No win streak. Almost no lead.

Byrne's eight - hitter and 8-3 victory left the Browns only a half game behind the front-running Tribe. It was enough to make a crowd of 15,119 sit through a drizzle.

REVERSE Another budding streak was kept alive when Chicago dumped Detroit, 2-0, for the Tigers' eighth straight loss. Five more and the Tigers can tie their own Major League record of 13 consecutive defeats at the start of the 1920 season.

Beavers Win On Conatser's Circuit Clout

Since last week they've climbed from seventh place to third in the standings and will be shooting for their seventh straight win when they square off against loop-leading San Diego Wednesday night.

Maintaining their present pace they could easily be at the top of the heap by week's end.

Tuesday night the Stars torpedoes the Padres 9-4 bagging six runs in the first inning. Elsewhere Portland squeaked by Los Angeles 3-2. Oakland edged Seattle 6-5, and San Francisco shaded Sacramento 7-6.

HOMER At Portland it was Clint Conatser's eighth-inning homer that turned the tide. It broke a 2-all tie and gave Portland's Lyman Linde his first pitching win of the season. Doyle Lade went the route for Los Angeles.

It took Oakland four pitchers to quell the cellar-dwelling Rainiers. Seattle was leading 5-2 until the eighth, when the Acorns scored four runs on a single by J. Ragni and a double by pinch hitter Lloyd Christopher.

GET DEMPSEY After the game, the Rainiers disclosed they have purchased Pitcher Don Dempsey from the Philadelphia Phillies. Dempsey was drafted by the Phillies from San Francisco last fall after the Seals made an unsuccessful effort to sell him for \$100,000 to Pittsburgh.

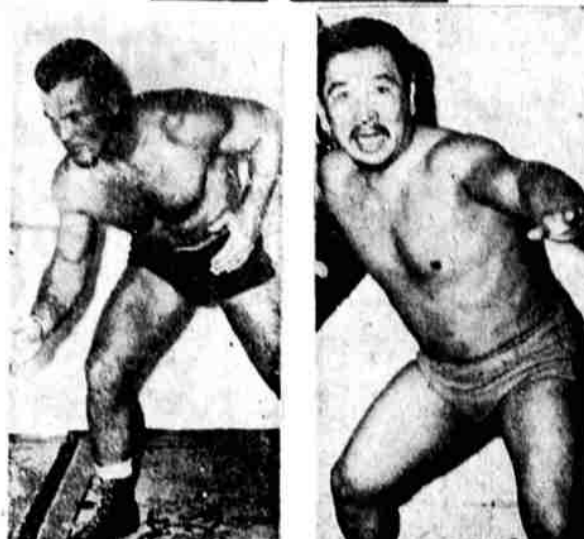
