Sports Bigwig Indicted On Tax Evasion Charge

ST. LOUIS, Mo. — Fred M. Saigh, owner of the St. Louis Cardinals and a business associate of the late Robert E. Hannegan, former postmaster general, has been named in a federal indictment charging income tax evasion of postmaster general, has been \$49,620.

The federal grand jury accused the 47-year-old attorney in a surprise action Tuesday. He is charged with evading taxes on \$108,823 unreported income for the years 1946 through 1949.

It was during those years that Saigh came into public prominence.

OSC Department Heads Named

'Witch' Loses Court Fight

KARLSRUHE, Germany. — Ilse Koch, known as the Witch of Buchenwald, still must serve out a life term for Nazi concentration camp atrocities.

The West German Supreme Court Tuesday night threw out her contention she had been convicted twice of the same crime. Hans Richter, president of the court, said the convictions were for different offenses.

A U. S. Court's life sentence, later reduced to four years, was assessed for crimes against Allied prisoners, he said. The German life sentence, which stands, was for crimes against German and Austrians.

Mrs. Koch, now 45, was represented at the hearing by a lawyer while she remained in her cell at Aichbach Prison.

Louisiana Stays In Demo Path

NEW ORLEANS, La. — Robert F. Kennon of Minden is Louisiana's new governor—to no one's surprise.

The Democratic nominee swamped his Republican opponent, Harrison Bagwell, the first GOP candidate in 12 years, in Tuesday's general election. C. E. Barham, state senator from Ruston and the Democratic choice for lieutenant-governor, also was elected without trouble.

Two other counts accuse him of filing fraudulent joint returns for himself and his wife. Saigh had little to say about the indictment other than it came "as a complete surprise."

What effect if any, the indictment will have on Saigh's future as a baseball owner is unknown.

Both Ford Frick, baseball commissioner, and Warren Giles, president of the National League, made no comment.
