'Shine, Deer Charges Made

OREGON CITY — Two Clackamas County men, accused of possessing and operating a moonshine still, were arrested by state police here Monday. The pair — George Bingham, 44, Milwaukie, and Suel Franklin Owens, 48, Estacada, also were charged with illegal possession of deer meat. Bail on the venison charge was set at \$500. Bail for the moonshine charge was set at \$300. State Police Officer Ted Elliott gave this account: Police were tipped Monday that a large quantity of illegal deer meat could be found in a shed at Milwaukie. They checked the shed and found 175 pounds of venison in a freezer. They said records indicated the shed belongs to Owens who lived in Estacada. They went to the Owens home where they found Bingham. Owens was discovered hiding in a closet. Also in the closet were six live cubs. A large quantity of sugar led police to suspect moonshining. A further search of the property revealed a still and 80 gallons of mash, Elliott said.

Enemy Cavalry Clad in White

SEOUL, Korea (AP) — A report of white-clad Chinese Communist cavalrymen on the central Korean front puzzled U. S. Eighth Army officers Tuesday. Front line units said they spotted 200 riders in white moving toward Kumson Monday afternoon. They said heavy artillery ripped the column to pieces. Two other white-cloaked bands of 50 and 60 men were reported sighted in the area. "We can't attach any significance to the report at this time," said an Eighth Army staff officer. "Intelligence officers are studying the details. All we have now are fragmentary reports." He said the white uniforms possibly could be explained by the probability of snow in the mountains northeast of Kumson. Communist cavalrymen were last reported on the front shortly after the entry of Red China into the war in the fall of 1950. The western and central fronts were generally quiet. There was a flurry of Red probing and patrol action in the mountainous east. U. S. Navy headquarters in Tokyo said five U. S. ships have been sunk by mines and 46 U. S. and 11 British Commonwealth warships were damaged by mines and one by an aerial bomb. The Navy said also that Red shore batteries lately have been firing with increased accuracy and greater range, and have shelled American warships nearly 10 miles at sea. Navy authorities said this almost certainly means the Reds are using radar-directed heavy guns. Allied warships and Naval planes attacked both coasts of North Korea Monday. The U. S. Cruiser Manchester and the U. S. Destroyer Rupert hurled 220 five-and-six-inch shells into constantly belated Russian on the east coast. Four Russian-made MIG-15 jets ventured from Manchuria into North Korea at dawn Tuesday. The Fifth Air Force said Capt. Jere J. Lewis of Soyato, Calif., shot down one and the three others scurried home.

Driver Dies In Car Upset

McMINNVILLE (AP) — An automobile bounced and over and into a ditch 10 miles southwest of here Monday night and killed the driver, Wesley Charles McNeil, 35, operator of the Williamina Tavern and Hotel. Fred Reimsma, route 3, McMinnville, told police that he was applying brakes in his own car, getting ready to turn from highway 15 onto a side road, when he saw McNeil's car coming up fast from the rear. Reimsma said as he turned, McNeil tried to pass on the right and lost control of the car. Police said McNeil's car skidded 31 feet on the highway, then bounced 262 feet along the ditch. McNeil apparently was killed outright. Coroner Glen Macy said a child and McNeil's divorced wife live at Jennings Lodge, his mother at West Linn.

State Department's Hold On Passports Challenged

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department's broad authority to deny or revoke passports was challenged in federal court Tuesday and a three-judge panel agreed to hear the case. The American Civil Liberties Union brought the test, urging the creation of standards for issuing and denying passports and machinery for hearings and reviews. It also called on Congress to make the issuance of a passport mandatory except for specific reasons. The State Department, in denying or revoking a passport, customarily merely states that authorized foreign travel by the individual in question would not be in the best interest of the United States. The test case involves the department's cancellation of the passport of Miss Anne Bauer, a naturalized American citizen who had been working in France as a free lance writer. The Civil Liberties Union complained that she was given no hearing and was arbitrarily deprived of her means of livelihood and her constitutional rights. She came to this country from Germany in 1938. Here is one of eight similar cases under special study by the union.

State Ponders Big Road Bid

PORTLAND (AP) — The Oregon State Highway Commission decided today to take a second look at the biggest bid on Monday's highway contract program, but it awarded a number of others including two in six figures. Then Tuesday it got offers on 20 more projects. On the Monday bids, the commission held over for consideration at its May meeting the \$697,645 offer by C. R. O'Neill, Creswell, for rebuilding the Hauser-Coos Bay section of No. 101. It rejected the Elgin rock production offers and accepted all other low bids. Some of the acceptances were tentative pending completion of right-of-way or other matters. In other action the commission: Denied a permit to the Milwaukie Historical Society for a building on highway property south of Milwaukie. Voted to consider further a proposal which would require counties to contribute county funds for improvement of county roads that are designated as federal aid secondary highways. Authorized \$10,500 for widening the south approach of the Sucker Creek Bridge on the Oswego Highway.

Brannan Cites Water Evils

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Secretary of Agriculture Brannan said Tuesday the nation has neglected control of river waters at their sources. Instead, he said in a statement, emphasis has been placed on building huge reservoirs and dams far down major streams to try to hold the water after it has started rushing into lowlands. Brannan appeared before a special House subcommittee studying the government's civil works program. He called for well-planned watershed programs, involving measures to retard runoff of water where it originates.

The three-judge panel selected to hear Miss Bauer's case is headed by Judge Charles Fahy of the U.S. Court of Appeals District Court Judges Edward M. Curran and Richmond B. Keen are the other members. State Department officials said authority to deny passports is based in general on the powers of the President to conduct foreign relations, an 1893 law which authorizes the issuing of passports and an executive order signed March 31, 1939, by President Roosevelt.
