LEGHORN, Italy (AP) — People here are saying a thirsty American in the middle of a desert would probably find a bottle of champagne—"they're that lucky."

This is why the U.S. Army supply port command here was having trouble arranging for adequate water supply. Leghorn has limited drinking water, and the Communist city administration was hesitant to allow the Americans large quantities.

The American engineers dug their own well. At 170 feet they struck a supply yielding 1,000 quarts a minute. Then doctors examined it. They found it a healthy mineral water of a kind that sells in Italy for 20 cents a bottle.

Seattle Chief Leaving Post

SEATTLE (AP) — Police Chief George D. Eastman disclosed Wednesday he will resign May 1 to accept a \$10,000-a-year position as western regional director of the National Safety Council.

Eastman, who had previously announced he would resign when Mayor-elect Allen Pomroy takes office June 2, will have his headquarters in San Francisco. He will direct the Safety Council's activities in 11 western states and Alaska and Hawaii. The San Francisco position has been vacant four years.

Youths Admit Car Thefts

ROSEBURG (AP) — Three teenagers were jailed here Monday night after a highway chase that led state police at 90 miles an hour.

They were held here on stolen car charges.

State Police Sgt. C. R. Borgman said the three told him of taking a half dozen cars between Eugene and Roseburg. The one in which they were driving when caught had been stolen here.

When the local car was taken a warning was broadcast. Myrtle Creek police spotted the car but couldn't catch it. State Patrolman Virgil Simpson took up the chase but at 85 to 90 miles an hour, he said, he was afraid he wouldn't catch the speeding car. But he didn't have to.

Shots fired over the top of the car as it careened down Sexton Mountain brought the car to a halt and the three in it ran into the brush. They were quickly nabbed.

Borgman identified them as John Penman Yeend, 16, Victoria, B.C.; Lyle K. Winjum, Madison, Wis. and Raymond Lee Lorentzen, 17, Portland. Borgman said Yeend and Winjum had escaped recently from a Portland juvenile home.
