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Softball New Deal Planned

Officers of the Klamath Falls Softball Association are operating this season on a New Deal program with the loan slated to open with a jamboree May 12.

This much came out of a meeting Tuesday night at City Hall.

The circuit has new officers, Conner Field is expected to be in top shape and a better brand of softball is promised softball patrons.

Seven teams are in the fold so far and league officials hope to launch the league with at least eight members.

Another meeting has been called for May 6, 7:30 p.m., in the City Hall, at which time entry fees and team rosters will be due.

On that night pairings will be drawn up for the curtain-raising jamboree.

Teams down for action now are Elks, Basin Auto Supply, Kalpine, Chilquien, Bill's Tavern, Suburban Tavern, and a teenage high school team still seeking a sponsor.

New president of the league is George Conner, replacing Frank Drew. Secretary-Treasurer is Bill Wilson.

Wilson said a new ruling had been laid down that would prevent teams reaching too far distances for players.

Players living within a 35-mile radius of their sponsors are eligible to compete.

Merrill may field a team to complete an eight-team family.

Current plans would have Conner Field doubleheaders three times a week—Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

The winner would meet Lakeview for the district title and the right to represent Southern Oregon in the State tournament.

Cain Shades Feller; Browns Take AL Lead

What goes with those revitalized, Hornsby-sized St. Louis Browns?

One night they "Byrne" up the Cleveland Indians' seven-game winning streak and the next they raise "Cain" with the Tribe, showing them out of first place and taking over the American League's top rung themselves.

Following on the heels of the splendid eight-hitter by Tommy Byrne Tuesday, Bob Cain unfurled a one-hit masterpiece Wednesday night as he pitched the rampage.

Cain had to pitch the best game of his life in order to win for Feller was magnificent, too, pitching a one-hitter himself. The lone Brownie safety, a triple by lead-off batter Bobby Young, proved Feller's undoing.

Marty Marion followed with a grounder to Al Rosen. When the third baseman fumbled the ball, Young scored the only run of the game.

It was the second time in Major League history that each pitcher limited the opposition to one hit.

On July 4, 1906, Mordecai (Three-fingered) Brown of Chicago and Lefty Leifield of Pittsburgh permitted only one hit each as the Cubs defeated the Pirates, 1-0.

On May 2, 1917, Hippo Jim Vaughn of Chicago and Fred Toney of Cincinnati pitched no-hitters each through nine innings. The Reds, however, nicked Vaughn for two hits and a run in the 10th to win 1-0 as Toney hurled a 19-inning no-hitter.

In other games, Wednesday, Boston's youth-infested Red Sox, behind the five-hit pitching of 37-year-old Eddy Kindner, defeated the New York Yankees, 3-1. Kindner walked six and fanned five in beating Allie (No-hit) Reynolds.

The New York Giants outslugged the Boston Braves, 9-5 in the only National League game.

Scheduled games between the St. Louis Cardinals and Cincinnati, Brooklyn and Philadelphia, Detroit and Chicago and Washington and the Philadelphia Athletics were postponed because of rain. Pittsburgh and Chicago's Cubs were idle.

Miami Beach, Fla. — Claude Hammond, 142½, North Bergen, N. J., outpointed Bill Neri, 142, Bridgeport, Conn., 10.
