Oregon Women Dig Deep Learn Much—Help Experts

National Home Demonstration week, April 27-May 3 will continue the theme, "Today's Home Builds Tomorrow's World" adopted in 1946.

Women all over America and many in Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico are benefited by the projects offered by the Extension Service. Home demonstration is that part of the program cooperatively offered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, state agricultural colleges, county and local groups to women, for the improvement of their homes.

Women study ways and means of improving family health and increasing family comfort and happiness. Drudgery is taken out of every day tasks by modernizing homes and by simplifying work. Beauty is taken to the homes through the study of color and design.

The interests of home extension women have advanced far beyond the four walls of their homes, according to home extension specialists. They have taken the logical step from better homes to better communities. Health clinics, hot school lunches, libraries and community beautification programs are sponsored. Other factors which effect the well-being of families, problems of good government, international understanding and good will are recognized and worked for.

to 517 home extension units and the number is growing steadily. Two thousand more women served as project leaders in Oregon last year than the year before—making a total of 9,000.

In 29 of Oregon's 36 counties, county extension agents in home economics are regular members of the county extension staffs.

The result of thousands of women working consistently for home improvement is beyond comprehension.

They have learned to repair and re-upholster furniture, how to use basic tools, plan step-saving kitchens, simply ironing, care for rugs, walls, woodwork, plan parties.

Last year, records compiled by county home economics extension agents, indicate their work reached 51,454 different Oregon families.

Many New Hybrid Fabrics Added To Age-Old Fibers

"Hybrid" fabrics are revolutionizing textiles, reports Miss Lucy Lane, extension clothing specialist at Oregon State college.

For thousands of years, she points out, the world got along with four textiles—cotton, linen, silk and wool. Now within a 50 year span, the consumer is suddenly faced

with some dozen kinds of man-made fibers. Seventy or more are still under production.

In the new hybrid fabrics, the best characteristics of natural and man-made fibers are combined to produce materials that meet special needs.

One such blend is 45 per cent wool and 55 per cent orlon. Wool had many fine qualities but its shrinkage in washing has never been completely controlled. The chief assets of orlon are easy washing and quick drying, as a mating of these fibers results in a washable fabric.

Another blend is 55 per cent wool, 12½ per cent nylon, and 32½ per cent vicara. This fabric inherits the warm resiliency of wool, the strength of nylon, and the cashmere feel of vicara.

A still different blend, 45 per cent worsted and 55 per cent dacron produces a hard finish fabric which holds its shape well and is even more crease-resistant. These and many other fabrics are now on the market, some in yardage and other available in ready-to-wear.

But new developments bring new problems, too. Miss Lane cautions homemakers to trade with reliable dealers and to look for labels. With recommended use and care, the consumer is back on the old trial-and-error basis, she warns.

Want a different frosting for a cake? Mash a ripe banana and add a quarter teaspoon of lemon juice to it. Then beat two tablespoons of butter until creamy and beat in 1 cups sifted confectioners' sugar alternately with the mashed banana until frosting is light and fluffy. This will cover the top of an eight-inch square cake.

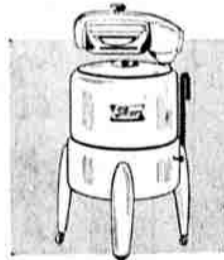
