MEXICO CITY (AP)—Mexico is setting aside immigration laws for the 8,000 Rotarians expected here next month. The Interior Department said Wednesday an active membership card in International Rotary will be sufficient to enter Mexico. Normal tourist card costing \$3 is necessary. The world convention opens here May 25.

Truman Denies Seizure Plans

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman said Thursday the thought of seizing the nation's newspapers and radio stations had never occurred to him. It is difficult to imagine the government taking such a step, he told his weekly news conference. Truman discussed his seizure powers in elaboration of an answer he gave at last week's news conference which alarmed many newspaper editors and lawmakers. He was asked then whether he could seize the press and radio as he had the steel industry. He replied that under similar circumstances, the President has to act for whatever is best for the country. A lot of hokey has been published since he made that remark, Truman said in disavowing the thought he might take over the press and radio.

Berlin Reds Stir French

BERLIN (AP)—Ten thousand young Communists filtered quietly into the French sector of Berlin Thursday night and started agitating with leaflets and speeches for German unity and withdrawal of all occupation troops. The illegal putsch by the Soviet sector youths was denounced on by West Berlin police and dispersed with fire hoses. Twenty young men were arrested. The crowd assembled at the sector border at the end of the working day. Blue-shirted Communist "Free German Youths" predominated in the throng. Several Germans who talked to the early gatherers said the aim seemed to be a sudden surge with banners and leaflets into the West.

demanding a "peace treaty" and German unity. Communists have bristled into the West in the past but not in such numbers. Hearing of the propaganda march, the Berlin police ordered their new "alert units," trained and equipped by the Allies, to be on

the guard along the Soviet sector border.

Combat Pay Hike Snagged

WASHINGTON (AP)—A proposal for extra combat pay of \$43 a month for most Korean War veterans was snagged Thursday in a congressional dispute and may die there.

At the same time between 40 and 70 million dollars in extra "cost-of-living" pay this month for all 3 1/2 million persons in the uniformed services also appeared doomed. However, eventual passage appeared bright for a bill to make those benefits available in future months.

These forecasts were made to a reporter by some members of a Senate-House Conference Committee who failed Wednesday in their initial attempt to work out a compromise.

These sources said the Senate-House group is near agreement on a "cost-of-living" pay boost for the armed services that would amount to about 473 million dollars a year additional.

Bennett Recall Goes on Ballot

PORTLAND (AP)—The measure to recall City Commissioner Jake Bennett will be on the primary election ballot in Portland.

The city auditor certified Wednesday that enough signatures had been obtained on recall petitions, Bennett said he has no intention to resign—the only way to stop the recall measure—so the matter will go before the voters May 16.

Week's Fishing Outlook Good

PORTLAND (AP)—The State Game Commission's weekly fishing report said Thursday that in the open areas, fishing this week end should produce some fine results. In Northwestern Oregon, Lincoln County streams promise to be from good to excellent. Upper Willamette Valley streams have been improving and should be fair to good. Mt. Hood area streams, though, are too cold.

In Southwestern Oregon coastal streams and lakes the fish should be biting well, the report says although spring Chinook fishing on the Lower Umpqua has been poor.

Sky Blaring Brings Kicks

PORTLAND (AP)—A low-flying plane with blinking soap-advertising lights and a loud-speaker playing records, caused complaints from householders here Wednesday night.

After several hours of checking, police reached the pilot who identified himself as Charles F. Hoover of Valparaiso, Ind. Police Lt. Ernest O. Vincent quoted him as saying he was sorry and he'd seek city approval of his advertising before any more flights.
