

Bonneville Power Supply Slated Arrive Here in Year and a Half

Bonneville power is scheduled to arrive in Klamath Falls in about a year and a half, and a construction contract on the first stretch of the 20,000 volt transmission line south from the substation just south of town on a site near Klamath Memorial Cemetery may begin next fall.

Erection of the transmission line from Maupin to Redmond is now underway, and that area is to have electrical power furnished by Bonneville available by November of this year.

By that time a substation is to be constructed about two miles south of Redmond, and Bonneville will be in a position to wholesale power to the Pacific Power and Light Company and the Central Electric

Co-operative serving that area. Right-of-way clearing for the stretch of line from Redmond to Klamath Falls started last year and may be completed sometime this summer. Construction of a substation just south of town on a site near Klamath Memorial Cemetery may begin next fall.

The clearing work is slightly ahead of schedule, reports Warren Ausland, construction engineer stationed here.

It is divided into seven different jobs, and the first two at the north end are almost complete. The first runs from the Redmond substation site down to about three miles southeast of Lava Butte, a distance of 28.6 miles, and the second from

that point 21.2 miles to just into Klamath County near Lapine.

The third right-of-way clearing job picks up there and comes south 20.8 miles to just north of the Willamette junction. That job is under way.

The fourth stretch of clearing hasn't started, held up for several months by a myriad of mining claims placed on national forest lands in the Willamette junction vicinity. The Bonneville Power Administration had to get easements not only from the U.S. Forest Service but from the people who have placed mining claims on the property. That five-mile stretch runs from just above the junction to a point three miles north of Chemult. Contract for that work probably will be let next month.

The fifth clearing job originates just north of Chemult and extends to the north boundary of the Klamath Indian reservation; the sixth through to the south boundary of the reservation; and the seventh from there on to Klamath Falls and to the substation site south of town.

Work on those are underway now.

EXPENSE
The contract cost of the right-of-way clearing on the six jobs now in progress between here and Redmond totals \$737,260, and that doesn't include other costs, such as obtaining the easements, moving or condemning some houses under the line, purchase of sites for various installations, or any construction of the transmission line.

Bonneville maintains an office here and one in Redmond, a maintenance garage at Chiloquin, and materials stockpiles here, at Chiloquin, Lapine, Crescent and Terrebonne.

The right-of-way being cut across country 150 miles over mountains and through forests, is generally 125 feet wide but will be somewhat wider here in town in the vicinity of Riverside School.

ROUTE
The arrival of the Bonneville transmission line here is scheduled to coincide with the putting into operation of a generator at McNary Dam, and power would be put into use here through the distributive facilities of the California Oregon Power Company.

The transmission line won't be visible to the casual highway or railroad traveler except at three points between here and Redmond. It runs mostly along ridges some distance from the road.

ROUTE
The right-of-way is located east of U.S. 97 from Redmond to the Willamette junction, and there crosses to the west side of the highway and is on that side down to the Spring Creek grade.

At that point it again crosses to the east side of the highway and stays there until it again crosses the highway north of town.

Rotarians Oppose Cut Of Park Board Power

A straw vote taken among members of the Rotary Club Friday indicates that the May 16 ballot proposal to bring the Park Board under the wing of the Klamath Falls City Council will receive small favor at the polls.

At present the Park Board, although appointed by the Mayor, is a charter agency and isn't subject to the City Council's wishes.

The ballot proposal, initiated by the Council, would clip the wings of the Park Board to the extent that its money, property and activities would be vested in the city Council.

OPINIONS
A forum discussion on the proposal was conducted, with Council-

man Mark Smith speaking for the proposal, and Former Councilman Red Busman, and Cap Collier, Park Board member, opposing.

Smith brought out that the City Council, while not having any authority over the Park Board, still gets the benefit of the way the parks are run. The particular sore spot, he pointed out, is the fact that in 1946 Klamath Falls taxpayers voted a levy to acquire Veterans Memorial Park, along Lake Ewauna, and still doesn't have a park there.

The reason advanced by the Park Board for not pushing that project is that at some future date the State Highway Commission may take that land for a four-lane entrance to town and ruin it for park purposes.

FREE HAND
Busman and Collier expressed the opinion that the Park Board should be out of politics, should be capable of a continuing and far-sighted effort and that the people of Klamath Falls are getting more for their money in the operation of parks and recreation than from other city agencies.

At the conclusion of the forum, Bud Chandler, conducting the forum, asked for a show of hands on how the Park Board would vote on the ballot proposal. The tally was heavily against.

Eight Allied Planes Lost

SEOUL (AP) — Communist ground fire knocked down eight Allied warplanes during the week ended Friday, the Far East Air Forces said Saturday.

That number matched the toll of Red MIG-15 jets shot down in air combat by U. S. F-86 Sabre jets during the same period. One Sabre jet was lost in the air fighting.

In its weekly summary the Air Force said three other Allied planes failed to return for unknown causes. One downed plane was Australian, the others American.

The Red toll was put at eight MIG-15s destroyed and eight damaged. The damaged planes included one of the seldom-seen "Type 15" aircraft.

Additionally, U.N. warplanes destroyed one IL-10 and two Yak-9s and damaged two Yaks in strafing attacks on Red airfields in North Korea.

The U. S. Eighth Army, in its weekly summary, said its troops inflicted 1,832 casualties on Red ground forces April 15-21. The figure, lowest in recent weeks, included 870 killed, 917 wounded and 36 captured.

In Washington the Army said Red casualties for the Korean War reached 1,666,069 April 16. That was an increase of 17,613 in two weeks.

Only patrol clashes were reported along the 155-mile battlefront.

STRIKERS PLAN WORK RETURN
PORTLAND (AP) — Western Electric warehousemen will return to work Monday, ending an 18-day labor dispute with the Bell System.

A nationwide agreement was reached in New York Friday and Frank Holman, president of the CIO Communications workers of America local, said pickets had been withdrawn from the Western Electric warehouse in Portland.

Military Gets Waste Label

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Senator Paul Douglas (D-Ill.) says that Army "specifications for pink pong balls" require 5 1/2 closely-typed pages.

He said so Friday night in charging that "over-specification" is one example of "waste" by the military.

"The military are the greatest wasters of manpower and materials we have," Douglas told the American Philosophical Society in a speech calling for economies in various departments of government.

Douglas hit hardest at the Army, asserting that "the Marine Corps is able to get 20 per cent more firepower for the same number of men than the Army."

Douglas is a Marine veteran of World War II.

Referring to the ping-pong ball and other specifications, he said: "Think of the time spent in the Pentagon by the generals, the colonels, the captains and others preparing these specifications."

Steel Seizure Rule Awaited

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government and the steel industry sweat-out in tense expectancy Saturday a period of waiting for an historic court decision on the legality of President Truman's seizure of the nation's steel mills.

After listening to arguments by lawyers of both sides in a crowded courtroom Friday, Federal District Judge David A. Pine said he would "take the case under submission and give it my attention to the exclusion of all other court business."

The 60-year-old jurist did not say when he might render his decision but legal experts said it may not be announced until Monday or later.

READING
The soft-spoken judge had plenty of reading material for the week end — hundreds of pages of legal briefs filed by the government and six steel companies and the transcript of almost two full days of testimony, filled with legal footnotes.

Meanwhile, the government authorized a \$13 a ton average price rise for steel, effective May 1. But it won't take effect until individual steel companies apply for it or the government decrees it in force.

Price Stabilizer Ellis Arnall said \$3 was all the steel companies were entitled to under present policy. The industry has estimated its costs would be boosted \$12 a ton if government-recommended wage boosts were put into effect.

The \$3 increase, on top of the current average steel price of \$110 a ton, was granted under the Capehart amendment to the controls law. That allows producers to raise prices enough to offset any cost increases between the start of the Korean War and last July 26. The industry never formally asked the government for price increases under the law.

BAR ASKED
The six companies engaged in the District Court action have asked that Secretary of Commerce Sawyer be forbidden to raise the wages of 650,000 CIO steel workers. Truman turned operation of the mills over to Sawyer after he seized them April 8.

Five of the companies also are asking Pine to declare the seizure order itself illegal, with Sawyer also the defendant in this suit.

The six companies involved in the court action produce 70 per cent of the nation's steel.

Reds Charged In Germ War

UNITED NATIONS N. Y. (AP) — America's top narcotics sleuth accused Red China Saturday of drug warfare against the U.N. in the Far East.

Harry J. Anslinger, U.S. narcotics commissioner, said he will present fully documented cases to prove his charge to the U.N. commission on narcotics drugs next week. Anslinger is the U.S. delegate to the commission.

He told a reporter the Oriental Communists had a two-fold purpose: Selling habit-forming drugs to finance party activities and buy war materials and spreading drug addiction to undermine the morale of U.S. and other troops in the Far East.

BIG TARGET
North Korean as well as Chinese Communists are involved in growing, smuggling and selling the drugs, chiefly heroin, Anslinger said. Japan is the principal target. Japanese Communists were enlisted in the ring, he said.

The charge is the first of its kind since the British announced two years ago that Red China was trying to peddle 500 tons of raw opium through Hong Kong. The Chinese Communists non-members of the U.N., have refused to answer the U.N. commission's request for information about their opium stock.

Anslinger said American business men also were approached by the Chinese Communists with an offer to exchange opium for cotton. They notified the government and did not trade.

UNIVERSITY BUILDING
EUGENE (AP) — A new \$1,600,000 science building was to be dedicated at the University of Oregon here Friday.

The ceremony was to follow an inspection of the building by the State Board of Higher Education, Gov. Douglas McKay and D. Alan Waterman, director of the National Science Foundation.

Dr. Waterman was to give the dedication address Friday night.

Young Democrats In State Meet

PORTLAND (AP) — The Young Democrats of Oregon opened their state convention here Saturday.

Jack Shodorass, Grants Pass, and Charles Zulauf, Eugene, have been mentioned as possible successors to Walter J. Dennis as president. Shodorass now is vice president and Zulauf treasurer.

Principal speaker will be State Rep. Robert Y. Thornton, candidate for attorney general.

Ex-Manville Wife Killed

GREENBURGH, N. Y. (AP) — George Campbell Manville, 33, estranged eighth wife of playboy Tommy Manville, was killed in an automobile accident here Saturday.

A car she was driving collided with another car at an intersection in this town, near White Plains, in Westchester County.

Detective Captain Eugene Brett of the Greenburgh police said she was thrown from the car and it came to rest on top of her.

The beautiful, English-born redhead, noted for her creamy white complexion, was alone in the car.

Manville, 38-year-old actor's heir, immediately drove to Greenburgh from his home in New Rochelle.

He appeared upset and declared: "Naturally it's a shock. I haven't gotten over that yet, but I will."

He said she had been enroute to his home for breakfast. Asked whether this meant a reconciliation had been in the offing he said: "No, but we have been friendly."
