Winnie Sees End of Debts
LONDON (AP) — Prime Minister Churchill said Friday that with effort and sacrifice Britain can pull out of the red in three or four years.
"It is my belief," he told a cheering audience of Conservatives, "that in three or four years we shall be able to present to our fellow countrymen a situation in which world peace will be more secure and British solvency firmly established."
In a fighting speech reminiscent of his wartime appeal for "blood, sweat and tears," the 77-year-old prime minister flailed his Socialist opponents for "splitting out their spite upon us."
"We shall not," he growled, "be turned from our course by their clamor or obstruction."
Churchill addressed the Primrose League, founded more than a century ago by leading conservatives and dedicated to keeping Britain strong. Its members gave him a standing ovation.
Churchill said his Conservative government is "trying its utmost to undo the harm of six years' Socialist rule which had brought us to the verge of national bankruptcy and left us to the high road..."

Carrier Cut Not Economy
NEW YORK (AP) — The Chief of Naval Operations said Friday House refusal to approve funds for a second jet plane carrier was not an economy move because the Navy offered to cut other shipbuilding to offset its cost.
Adm. William B. Fechteler, in a speech at the Bond Club of New York, said the elimination of the 208 million dollar carrier from the 1953 defense appropriations was a serious blow to the Navy.
The House not only reduced Navy requests by the amount sought for the second 60,000-ton carrier — the first is under construction — but it specifically forbade the Navy to use other funds to get it started. The Senate has yet to act on the defense budget.
Fechteler said that the carrier was the prime priority project in the Navy's construction program. He asserted that he was "deeply and seriously concerned" with the loss of the carrier because he saw "a repetition of a situation which has befallen naval strength in the past."
The Navy's operating chief declared that elimination of the big carrier "is to deny the Navy the use in a very few years of the best planes which industry can build for purposes of carrier attack."
He said the "Forrestal" started by the Navy last year will be able to handle the heavier and faster jet planes which will be available before the vessel is completed in about four years.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Rondthaler, she fell into the river earlier Friday while playing with neighbor children near her home.

Crippled Man Killed by Car
GRANTS PASS (AP) — Stanton Rowell, 66, whose hip was broken last summer when a man running from a store bumped into him, headed for the Elks club at dusk Friday. As he crossed a street, aided by a crutch, a car hit him. He was killed outright.
Rowell came here in 1907 from Portland and bought a photographic and music shop from Amos E. Voorhis. By coincidence, it was a car owned by Mr. Voorhis's newspaper which caused his death.
At one time Rowell was a printer and once was assistant foreman of the Washington State printing office at Olympia. In 1937 he sold his music shop here and retired.
He was a member of the Elks, a 32nd degree Mason, and a past grand chancellor of the Oregon Knights of Pythias.
Robert R. Mounie, 16, an employee of the circulation department of the Daily Courier, was driver of the car which hit him. Mounie said he didn't see Rowell, who was wearing dark clothes.
