Art launched the comeback drive Saturday with a spectacular 13-9 one-hit victory over the Cleveland Indians. Gray followed his roommate's gem with a 1-0 six-hit triumph over the tough tribe Sunday.

Ironically, Cleveland's Harry Simpson was the "villain" and "goat" in the two games.

Simpson spoiled Houtteman's bid for fame at the eleventh hour. The Indians outfielder singled with two out in the ninth inning to smash the no-hit bid.

Sunday, a first inning error by Simpson led to the lone run of the game.
