

Police Charge Horse Rustler

PENDLETON, O. — Police are holding a man accused of riding a horse in Pendleton and taking it to the 65 miles to Pasco, Wash.

Pasco police reported he was Ervin Curtis, who had registered earlier at a Pendleton hotel as E. Day. Curtis, Nelson of Pasco, said he bought the horse for \$50, became suspicious of the deal and called police. Police arrested Curtis as he was buying a bus ticket for Yakima.

The horse, belonging to Beverly Jean Vaughn, 14, daughter of Jablin Vaughn, former mayor of Pendleton, disappeared from a Pendleton stable a few hours before it was to be sold.

A traveler later reported he saw a man riding the horse north near Wallula.

Union Asks End Of Immigration

VANCOUVER, B. C. — The International Woodworkers of America (IWA) B. C. district Saturday asked the federal government to stop immigration into British Columbia and to assist in moving unemployed immigrants to other sections where work is available.

A letter sent to Federal Immigration Minister Harris expressed alarm at the large number of new Canadians presently in the ranks of unemployed loggers in the coastal area.

The letter said the IWA "is gravely concerned due to the critical employment situation in the lumber industry."

Big Strikes Threaten N.W.

Strikes by nearly 90,000 workers in three industries were threatened Saturday in the Pacific Northwest.

The biggest proposed strike would involve 74,000 CIO lumber workers in five Northwest states and British Columbia. In other labor disputes bakers threatened to stop work next week in Oregon, Washington and North Idaho, and machinists made strike plans in Seattle and Spokane.

Negotiations collapsed at Portland between CIO woodworkers and the Lumbermen's Industrial Relations Committee. A. F. Hartung, union president, said 42,000 woodworkers in the five states would strike unless an agreement was reached before midnight Monday.

The union is asking employers

and welfare program amounting to 9 1/2 cents per work hour.

In British Columbia spokesmen for 32,000 CIO woodworkers threatened to take a strike vote before the June general election if negotiations with employers are deadlocked. Coastal logging operators have proposed a 10 per cent wage cut for part of the workers, and no increase for the rest. The union asks a general increase.

Workers of the AFL Bakery and Confectionery Workers Union threatened to strike next Friday. A walkout would involve some 10,000 bakers in Oregon, Washington and Lewiston, Ida. Union and employer negotiations have been deadlocked for months over a question of days off.

More than 2,000 APL machinists in 42 Seattle metal fabricating shops scheduled a strike for Wednesday after the Central Labor Council there placed the shops on its "unfair list."

In Spokane machinists in 12 shops set a strike for Monday noon in a wage dispute.

Harris Leaving Benny Show

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Comedian Jack Benny has dropped band-leader Phil Harris in favor of Bob Crosby.

Benny said Sunday night he'll continue his radio and television shows on CBS next season for the American Tobacco Co., but has hired Crosby "because Harris is not available for the Benny television show."

All other regulars remain in the cast. Benny appears on radio weekly and TV every four weeks.

Recently Harris signed an exclusive radio-TV show with NBC and just isn't available for the Benny show next fall.

Three Killed As Jets Hit

KENT, Eng. (AP) — A burning U.S. Thunderjet fighter crashed into the Main Street bank building of this little Southeast England town Saturday, killing the American pilot and an elderly British couple.

The explosion collapsed the bank structure in flames which flashed into an adjoining home, critically burning a housewife as she cooked her Sunday dinner.

The pilot, whose body was hurled into a yard adjoining the destroyed building, was identified only as Capt. Clifford Froggarty, 29. The dead couple, found in the ruins, were in their apartment above the bank offices.

NOTICE OF ELECTION UPON QUESTION OF INCREASING TAX LEVY OVER AMOUNT LIMITED BY SECTION 11, ARTICLE XI, STATE CONSTITUTION. (Summary of Section 11, Article XI, as below.)
Section 11, Article XI, provides that a school district in any year shall not exercise its power to levy a tax by raising a greater amount of revenue for purposes other than the payment of bonded indebtedness or interest thereon, plus 6 per cent, than it has raised for the same purpose in any one of the three years immediately preceding.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an election will be held May 19, 1952, in Klamath County School District of Klamath County, State of Oregon, from 2:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. at Elementary School Buildings in said school district, for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of said district the question of increasing the tax levy for the fiscal year 1952-53 over the amount limited by Section 11, Article XI, of the Constitution of Oregon.

The reason for increasing such levy is:
That the tax base established is insufficient to provide even the minimum essentials for the operation of the district under present conditions.
The amount of tax, in excess of the 6 per cent limitation, proposed to be levied for said fiscal year, is \$334,620.19.
