Two Prisoners Fight Sheriff

HEPPER — Morrow County Sheriff C. J. Bauman reported Sunday that two prisoners attacked him while he and a guard were arriving from Caldwell, Idaho. The prisoners, Vernon West and Jack Amason, both of Bakerfield, Calif., are accused of robbing a motorist and stealing a car near Boardman, Ore. They were arrested at Caldwell. Bauman and Sheriff's Deputy Harry Tamblin had picked the men up and were driving them back to Hepper when one of the men suddenly looped a belt around Bauman's neck, the Sheriff said. The other prisoner attacked Tamblin, according to the report. Tamblin subdued the two prisoners by drawing his gun. Bauman said both he and Tamblin were scuffed up and bruised in the fight.

U.N. Offers Solutions To Big Truce Questions

MUSKIE — The United Nations command Monday gave the Communists what it called an "overall solution" to the three critical issues blocking a Korean armistice. Details were not disclosed. But the Communists, after agreeing to keep the full dress negotiations secret, asked for an indefinite recess. Presumably they want to submit the plan to Peiping and Pyongyang. Brig. Gen. William P. Nuckols, U.N. spokesman, said: "The United Nations command feels that an overall solution to the problem is possible and for that reason such an overall solution was proposed today." It was handed to the Communists at the first meeting of the main Allied and Communist armistice delegations in Panmunjon in more than two months. Blocking progress in the 9 1/2 months of truce negotiations are the issues of prisoner exchange, nomination of Russia by the Reds as a neutral observer during armistice and a U.N. demand for restrictions on air field construction. Vice Adm. C. Turner Joy, senior U.N. negotiator, proposed at the outset of the plenary session that the discussions be secret. This meant that there would be no announcement of what takes place. The Communists, after thinking it over for a half hour, agreed. Despite official secrecy, there was little doubt the prolonged talks had entered a new and perhaps decisive phase. The next meeting of the top negotiators will be called by the Communists. Meantime discussions at the staff officer level were suspended. There appeared little doubt that the package proposal centered on the all important question of prisoners and how to exchange them.

Two Stolen Cars Found

Two automobiles reported stolen here in town Saturday night were recovered, also here in town, Sunday. One, a 1952 Chevrolet sedan owned by Milton (Bus) Thompson, was taken from his residence, 315 Jefferson. A short time after Thompson reported it missing the car was located by City Police, but during the interlude the license plates had been switched and a rear view mirror had been broken off. The car originally had Oregon license 722-729, but when located Sunday it bore Oregon license 339-258. State Police said the latter plates were listed as belonging to a 1935 Plymouth coupe owned by E. J. Brown, Ashland. Brown told state Police he sold the coupe a year and a half ago. The second vehicle reported stolen was a 1947 Ford pickup owned by Jerry Whitlatch, taken from in front of the Marion Apartments. It was located Sunday afternoon on top of N. 6th Street hill.

Admiral Punches Village Rector

BRIDGWATER, Eng. (AP) — Rear Adm. Ernest W. Leir (retired), World War II, was fined 20 pounds (456) Saturday for punching his village rector. Leir told the court he believed the Rev. Harold G. Cole was aiming at him in a Sunday sermon against vanity.

KFPA to Get Radio Help

A new radio relay-transmission setup proposed for the Klamath Forest Protective Association will step up communications between the outfit's headquarters and its far-flung fire-fighting forces scattered across a million acres of the Klamath Basin. KFPA protects more square miles than there are in the state of Rhode Island. The State Highway Dept. will build a transmission line up Hogback Mountain, according to KFPA boss Hal Ogle. A radio relay will be built on the summit of the mountain and will relay radio signals from the present headquarters station. The signals from the headquarters, on the ridge above the Weed-Ashland junction, will be in FM, and the relay will retransmit it out on short wave. At present the KFPA radio, located at the headquarters, cannot reach some areas under its jurisdiction without manually relaying through one of the nearby lookouts. The outfit has 25 radio stations which will be scattered over the area as soon as fire season gets underway.

Jury Decides Murder Guilt

OREGON CITY (AP) — Elmer Dorsey Williams, convicted Sunday of second degree murder in the fatal beating of Jalmar Tarkia last January, will be sentenced Wednesday by Circuit Judge Ralph M. Holman. Williams was accused of beating the 68-year-old Portland man in the Milwaukee home of Mrs. Bonnie Kuhnhausen Jan. 6. Mrs. Kuhnhausen will face trial on a first degree murder charge in July in connection with the same slaying. The jury deliberated 4 1/2 hours before returning its verdict.
