Reed Placed On Probation

Several councilmen said the portion sought by Sacred Heart Academy was only a small portion of the Rotary donated land, and the \$2,610 approved price offered would more than compensate the Rotary Club for expenditures they made on that portion of the property.

In other council action last night \$51,020 in building permits was approved. Of that total \$40,000 went for construction of a new grain warehouse at Spring and S. 6th Sts. by Pacific Co-op and Supply.

Resignation of John P. Linman 39 Nevada Ave. from chairmanship of Klamath War Memorial Committee was accepted by Mayor Robert A. Thompson.

The council fired a memo to the Park Commission recommending it take over irrigation and maintenance of parking areas on California and Pacific Terrace because persons abusing the property find that the cost of such work (after installing grass and sprinkling systems) is too burdensome.

Ordinances were introduced to license clubs providing dancing and liquor and another to enforce the state laws by the city on illegal sales of liquor and narcotics.

Shanholtzer was a choker setter and was killed when a swinging log struck him. He had resided in Coos Bay 19 months.

Surviving besides his parents are his widow Ruby Cook Shanholtzer, a baby son, Tony, 20 months old, both of Coos Bay; four brothers, Leo, stationed at Thunderbolt, Ga., with the Airforce; Glenn, Paisley, Ore.; Wayne and Thomas, both of Klamath Falls; and two sisters, Carol Jean and Beverly Joan both of this city.
