Tabulation Gives Taft Two-Delegate Lead over Ike

Delegate tabulations by the Associated Press up to 11:30 a.m., EST, Wednesday showed Sen. Taft leading Gen. Eisenhower for the Republican presidential nomination by only two votes, 269 to 266, with 134 uncommitted or disputed.

Taft forces claim more than 300 however. There are 616 needed to nominate.

The change from Tuesday's lineup came from Eisenhower winning 29 of Massachusetts' 36 in Tuesday's primary and picking up one in a Missouri district convention.

Taft took only three in the bay state to raise his total that much. Six more delegates there are uncommitted.

Another favorite son entered the Democratic lists today with 15 of Massachusetts' 36 delegate votes

known to favor Gov. Phil Dever on the first ballot.

The rest are uncommitted at present.

The figures in both parties, based on delegates pledged, instructed, favorable or willing to start a first ballot choice, and candidate concessions:

Survivor May Solve Mystery

WASHINGTON (AP) — A deck officer who escaped may help solve the mystery of the minesweeper Hobson's disastrous crash with the Carrier Wasp.

A radioed dispatch from the damaged Wasp, steaming slowly for New York with 61 survivors of the Hobson aboard, disclosed that Lt. (J.G.) B. E. Cummings, one of those rescued, was junior officer of the deck at the time of the collision.

The Hobson's skipper, Lt. Cmdr. W. J. Tierney, managed to get clear of the wreckage before it sank Saturday in mid-Atlantic, but he was not found. One hundred and seventy-five of the ship's company went down with her.

Of major importance to the Naval Court of Inquiry, when it convenes at New York next week, will be what orders were given aboard the Hobson in the moments before the collision and what signals were exchanged between the minesweeper and carrier.

From them, the court may learn why the sweepers laid a course which brought her under the knife-like prow of the carrier.

Cummings may be the officer who can tell that story.

'Lewis and Clark Tourway' Sought

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Jackson (D-Wash.), has proposed establishment of a "Lewis and Clark National Tourway."

He introduced a bill Wednesday to authorize the federal commissioner of roads and interested State Highway Departments to designate a system of highways for the memorial route.

The proposed Lewis and Clark road would extend from St. Louis, Mo., along the general route of the Lewis and Clark Expedition through Montana, and Idaho to Seaside, Ore.

Woodworkers Back to Jobs

TACOMA (AP) — Some 1,000 CIO woodworkers employed at the St. Paul and Tacoma Lumber Co. mill Wednesday night accepted a 7 1/2 cents an hour wage increase offered by the company and agreed to return to work ending a two-day strike.

Ed Lohre, president of Local 2-9 of the Tacoma District International Woodworkers of America Union, said planing mill workers were to return Thursday. The others will be back on the job Monday, he said.

The millworkers walked out Monday when other IWA men in the Pacific Northwest went on strike, then conducted independent negotiations.

Lohre said benefits in the new agreement include a night differential boost from 4 to 6 cents an hour, and a decrease from five to three years for eligibility for two weeks vacation.

Winds Blast At Northwest

High winds with gusts up to 70 miles an hour raked the Pacific Northwest from Oregon to British Columbia Wednesday.

Fishing boats were driven to shelter, two ships were grounded, and trees and tall chimneys toppled as the storm moved in from the Pacific. Lightning, rain and hail accompanied the winds in some areas.

The Weather Bureau recorded 60-mile-an-hour gusts at the mouth of the Columbia River and 70-mile-an-hour winds were reported in British Columbia.

Seven hundred fishing boats scheduled to open the salmon season early Wednesday remained in port. Others already offshore sought shelter.

The fishing boat Alva of Juneau, Alaska, and the tugboat Victoria Straits of Vancouver went aground on the British Columbia coast. The Alva was grounded in Gabriola Pass, near Nanaimo, and the Victoria Straits hit a reef outside Merry Island, 50 miles northwest of Vancouver.

Trees blown down by the wind blocked travel on U. S. 101, north of Arch Cave tunnel in Oregon for a time, and windows were broken and chimneys damaged at Astoria. Power lines also were broken.

Lightning struck and split a flag pole in North Vancouver, B. C.

Bonneville Line

PORTLAND (AP) — The Bonneville Power Administration said Wednesday a \$10.4M contract has been awarded for clearing the right-of-way and building the Madras-Redmond 230-KV transmission line. The contract went to Midland Constructors Inc., Huntington Park, Calif.
