Stojack hoisted Yamato for his famous airplane spin in the second heat—but it was too close to the ropes. Getting a foothold on the ring apron, Yamato grabbed the sleeper from behind. Referee Wally Moss broke it up, but Stojack was groggy from the gimmick. Yamato rushed in the ring to finish the job. Despite frantic efforts of seconds, Stojack didn't wake up in time for the third chapter.

Broken Tuesday night by Brooklyn's Preacher Roe for the eighth straight time and wandering two games under 500, Manager Stanky finally pulled the sheets off second baseman Stanky.
