

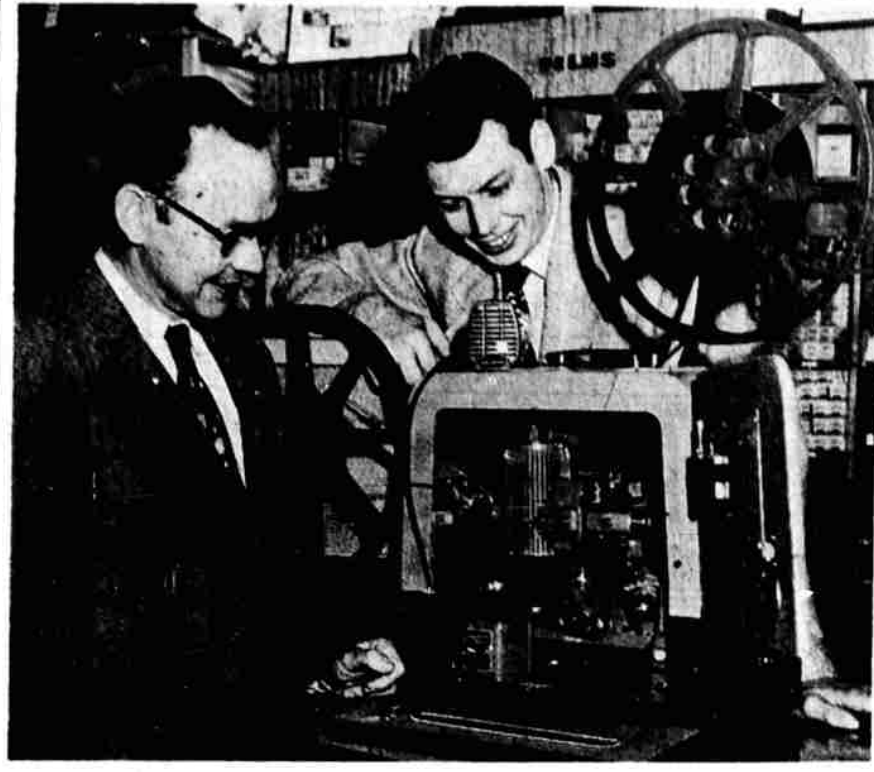

County Chamber Leaders Consider Road Program

The Klamath County Chamber of Commerce's road program — the work it wants done in the near future — was outlined Wednesday by Tom Waiters, Roads Committee chairman, at the luncheon of the Chamber Board of Directors.

The program includes:

- Improvement of a five-mile stretch of Oregon 58 between Meridian Dam and Oakridge.
- Extension of the Algoma cutoff of U.S. 97 to Modoc Point. That \$350,000 project is to be done this year.
- Realignment of U.S. 97 from Diamond Lake Junction to the Deschutes County line.
- Construction on the West Side pass to take through traffic around Klamath Falls.
- Widening of Oregon 39 from Merrill out to the Merrill-Malin Junction.
- Construction of a new S. 6th viaduct.
- Improvement of Oregon Avenue out to Fremont.
- Improvement of the Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway.
- Surfacing of the Old Midland road.
- Construction of an improved state secondary highway around the west side of Upper Klamath lake. A portion of that job has been bid on and turned down three times, but the Highway Commission is expected to call for bids again this morning, extending the project up to the Lake of the Woods junction.

Darling Named Union Ranger

Charles M. Darling has been named district ranger of the Union Creek district, Rogue River National Forest, announces Supervisor J. H. Wood.

He replaces Harold Chriswell, who has been promoted to a position on the staff of the Mt. Hood National Forest at Portland.

Darling has been stationed on the Chelan National Forest, with headquarters at Winthrop, Wash.

Nut HQ Moving To Portland

PORTLAND — The Northwest Nut Growers Association will move its operations to Portland this year.

The association awarded a contract for a \$285,000 warehouse and nut processing plant to L. H. Hoffman Construction Co.

Headquarters of the group which markets walnuts and filberts for 3,000 Oregon and Washington growers, will be moved from Dundee, Ore., to Portland about June 1. Operations at the Newberg plant will cease at the close of the season.

Hot Fight Seen for Public And Private Power Rights

SEATTLE (AP) — An intensified battle between public and private power groups was forecast Thursday by Alex Radin, general manager of the American Public Power Association.

Radin charged in a speech prepared for the Association's annual convention private companies are undertaking "one of the most lavish propaganda and lobbying campaigns in history."

He said the campaigns are directed "toward smearing public power with the 'Socialist' tag."

"I think a counter-attack on this program is long overdue," Radin said.

Man Confesses Morals Guilt

Robert Allen Pritchard, theater manager accused of morals offenses against young girls, Wednesday afternoon in Circuit Court pleaded guilty to three counts of contributing to the delinquency of minors.

At the same time he admitted serving three previous prison sentences, for car theft and burglary.

The 45-year-old Pritchard was returned to the County Jail and sentenced was postponed by Judge David R. Vandenberg until an FBI report of the man's criminal record was received.

Pritchard was arrested Tuesday afternoon, accused of enticing and endeavoring to persuade three young girls—aged 15, 13 and 12—to submit to unnatural sex practices.

The charges also accused him of showing the girls lewd and pornographic pictures. The actions allegedly occurred in the Tower theater office last Saturday.

Pritchard had been manager of the theater since March 4, coming here from San Francisco.

He waived preliminary hearing, grand jury indictment and admitted his guilt in court. He told Judge Vandenberg he had served two years in prison in Colorado for car theft, the sentence imposed in 1924, 14 months for burglary in Nebraska, that sentence dating back to 1927, and nine years in Missouri for burglary, being released in 1941.

He denied having any previous record for morals offenses.

In recent years he worked as a female impersonator in San Francisco and Portland clubs.

His bail was set at \$15,000.

SHIP SALVAGE PLANNED

SINGAPORE (AP)—Two ocean liners and a coal bulk whose scrap value is worth several million dollars are soon to be salvaged from the depths of Singapore harbor.

The victims of bombing and mine during World War II, the ships are the Empress of Asia, the Sirdhana and the bulk Oscar II.

New Freeway Set for 99

Construction of a four and a half mile section of freeway, most of it four-lane divided, along U.S. 99 north of Dunsmuir will get underway in the near future, according to the California Division of Highways.

Bids on the mammoth job were opened at Sacramento Wednesday and the firm submitting the lowest bid was A. Piechert and Son, Construction Company of Sacramento.

The company's figure was \$1,048,738.50.

There were nine other bidders.

The construction is to run from the north limits of Dunsmuir north to Big Canyon toward Mt. Shasta, and the project will be a divided, four-lane freeway for the entire length with the exception of a three-quarter mile section of highway just south of Big Canyon, which will be two-lane.

California state engineers estimate that the project will be completed in late 1953.

The new freeway will follow generally the location of the present highway, though sharp curves will be eliminated and steep grades reduced. No grade on the freeway will be more than 5 per cent.

The project entails considerable purchase of property and moving of buildings, shifting of telephone lines and water and gas mains, and relocation of the California Oregon Power Company's Dunsmuir substation.

Radio Sleuths Give up Work

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The single official responsible for detecting spy and other illegal radio transmitters throughout Northern California and Nevada quit Wednesday night.

Insufficient manpower and inadequate equipment was the reason given by Frank Rosch, supervisor of investigation for the Federal (FCC).

He said engineers in similar posts across the country also are snowed under. He blamed it all on "inadequate appropriations for the FCC."

The result, he said, is that:

1. Lives of airline passengers are endangered. "There is always the possibility of unexplained (airplane) crashes that the cause was directly attributable to radio interference."
2. Armed forces communications are hampered.
3. The way is open to ramblers to transmit race results to bookmakers. "I know there is a ring of ramblers in the East Bay with radio transmitters in their cars. But how can one man catch them actually transmitting?"
4. It is difficult to detect any cases of subversive transmitters. "I just don't know," Rosch said. "Whether there are any spies using radio transmitters, we don't have enough men and proper equipment to find out."
