Cotton Price Controls Off

WASHINGTON (AP)—Price Stabilizer Ellis Arnall said Thursday price controls on raw cotton and cotton textiles and apparel probably will be suspended next week. Textiles and apparel have been selling well below ceilings for some time. There has been a wide demand for control of those items. Arnall said that although cotton is selling not too far below ceiling, the Office of Price Stabilization probably will have to suspend ceilings on the raw material along with those on textiles and apparel. The ceiling set about 13 months ago on raw cotton was 45.76 cents a pound for white and extra-white middling 15-16th inch staple length—a basic grade.

Timber Strike Trouble Eases

The effect of the CIO Woodworkers strike eased somewhat in the fir area Thursday with one big mill and a number of smaller mills and logging operations back in production. But pickets showed up for the first time at Spokane and Coeur d'Alene.

The big mill is the St. Paul and Tacoma Lumber Company, which reached agreement with its 1,000 CIO employes.

The smaller mills induced their employes to work by promising them whatever benefits union negotiators win from major producers.

The Spokane and Coeur d'Alene pickets went on duty after Inland Empire talks far into the night failed to bring agreement for Eastern Washington and Northern Idaho operations. Some 3,500 workers were involved in the discussions.

The strike continued against other major firms, although one big company left the previously solid front of employers in the

Lumbermen's Industrial Relations Committee. That was the Simpson Logging company of Shelton, Wash., which said it was ready to start separate negotiations with the CIO.

Henry Bacon, Seattle, a company vice-president, said the firm has not withdrawn from the committee permanently. It has just temporarily withdrawn its negotiating rights, he said.

A union spokesman said separate negotiations also had been conducted with at least one plywood mill. He added that several small operators, including eight near Forest Grove, Ore., had signed up.

The union struck Tuesday after negotiations with employer organizations broke down. The main point in dispute is a health and welfare fund. The union wants it

financed by employers. The employers want it deducted from wages.

That fund was not an issue at the St. Paul and Tacoma plant, for the company has long had a welfare program which for two years has been wholly company financed. The agreement there was based on a pay boost of 7 1/2 cents an hour, night differential boost of 2 cents, and two weeks vacation after three years instead of five years.

Except for Weyerhaeuser Timber Co., all the major firms, manned by CIO workers, were affected by

the strike in Northern California, Oregon and in Western and Central Washington.

Firms in Eastern Washington, Idaho and Western Montana continued operating while negotiations went on there.

Weyerhaeuser earlier reached agreement with the union.



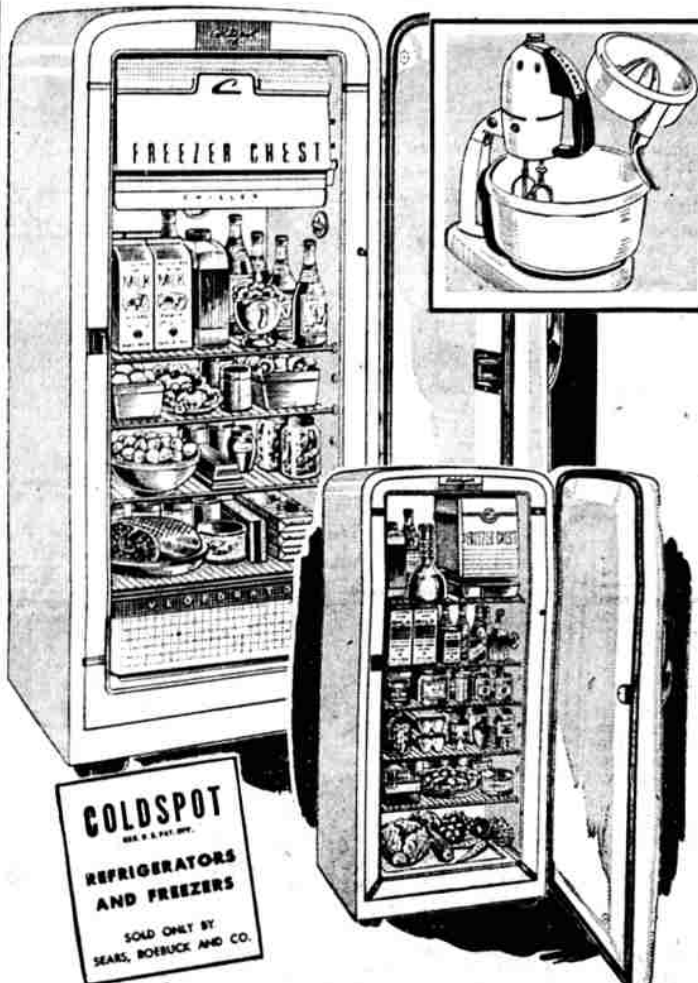

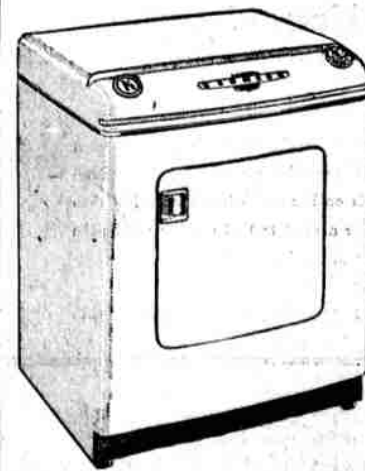

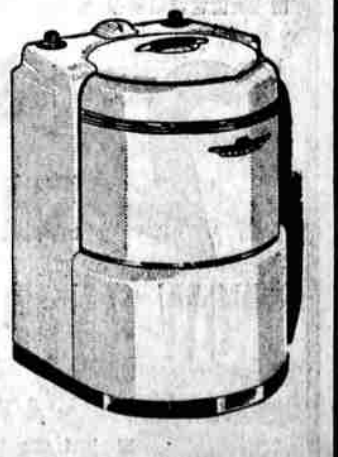
