

Wolfe, Turner in Furious Draw

Vanderveer Grabs Nod From Weiser

Dick Wolfe and Earl Turner stood toe to toe last night at the Army and battled to a draw.

There were no knockdowns in the ten rounds but both the Northwest welterweight champion and the Earl of Richmond just missed finding a payoff punch.

Turner landed more punches than did Wolfe, for the most part machine-gun left jabs. But Wolfe had the heavier artillery and his body left hook and right cross combination came close several times to sending the fans home ahead of the ten-hour schedule.

Referee Wally Moss gave the nod to Wolfe.

Judge Floyd Wynne of KFLW favored Turner.

The Herald and News scorecard labeled the brawl a draw.

It was that close.

The first round was a cautious heat with both fighters landing the feel of things in a swap of left jabs.

OPENS UP

Turner opened up in the second round to score with a flurry of lefts and rights that didn't hurt Wolfe but kept the Indian lad off balance.

Wolfe got his left hook to the mid-section working in the third chapter, a blow that started in a routine left jab and ended with a rebounding whack on Turner's ribs.

The welter champ shifted his left hook to the body in the third but Turner kept coming even with a neat rat-a-lat jab turn.

The tempo slowed somewhat in the fifth but in the sixth Wolfe turned the valve on an exploding one-two parlay, following his left hook to the ribs with a right cross to Turner's head. But the canny Richmond veteran took a lot of sting out of the attack by riding with the right.

BEST ROUNDS

The seventh and eighth were Turner's best. His frustrating left jab that turned into a glancing hook kept Wolfe off balance.

Wolfe closed the gap in the ninth as he crowded Turner in an all-out effort for a knockout. Only Turner's ring generalship kept him in a vertical position.

Sending the fight was close, both gladiators opened up in earnest in the last round. Both got in good hits.

Blackie Vanderveer, a shifting moving lightweight target from Seattle, outclassed Ralph Weiser in the semi-windup. Moss called it a draw but both judges gave the nod to Vanderveer.

The Seattle boy had the decision coming. He landed the fight and frustrated Weiser's best bombs with a rolling, weaving style. Weiser rocked Vanderveer on at least two occasions but most of the time Vanderveer kept leather in the Seattle fighter's face.

GOES OVER

Jimmy Murphy, bombastic Portland kid and Wolfe's stablemate, caught on with the fans with a two-fisted attack that battered Merrill's Stan Viggs out in the third round of a scheduled four-rounder.

Murphy's style wasn't smooth, but it was emphatic. A barrage of rights and lefts dropped Viggs twice in the second round, twice more in the third. Moss stopped it in the 15th of the third.

Viggs' fourth trip to the canvas. Bly's Billy Plummer stopped Bonanza's Phil Jackson in 1:40 of the fourth round by TKO; Millard Johnson, Seattle Negro, and Gabriel Estrada of Chilouquin scuffled to a draw in the two four-round prelims.

Promoter Mack Lillard is planning on another boxing show May 23.

Al Rosen's Home Run Spree Ignites Tribe

Al Rosen's winter batting practice is paying off for the Cleveland Indians with a spring home run spree.

Rosen hit a satisfactory 308 while the Indians jousted with the other Western clubs. Once they hit the East early this week, he caught fire. Against the Philadelphia A's and Washington he collected nine hits in 18 at bats for a .500 mark, boosting his average to .368.

Tuesday night he hit three home runs at Philadelphia. Friday night he blasted his seventh homer of the year, with two on, to trample Washington, 6 - 2. He is tied with Boston's Wall Droppo for the American League lead with 15 runs batted in.

Droppo set the home run pattern in the afternoon at Fenway Park with a bases - loaded blast off Ned Garver in the Boston Red Sox's 13-6 riot against the St. Louis Browns.

Garver coasted along with a 3-1 lead until the Sox cut loose with a big nine in the sixth. A balk called by Umpire Charlie Berry and an error by Rookie Jim Rivera on Don Lenhardt's long drive upset Garver. Droppo's smash knocked him out.

Eddie Lopat, a little off the beam in his previous starts, found the groove against Detroit to throw a two - hitter for the Yanks' 4-1 victory.

WEIRD

Philadelphia outscrambled the Chicago White Sox, 13 - 12, in a weird night game at Shibe Park where 11 pitchers took turns dish-up base hits.

Omar "Turk" Lown of the Chicago Cubs made the big news in the National when he pitched eight no - hit, no - run innings against Brooklyn only to slow up in the ninth and lose, 3 - 1.

MIZZELL WINS

Rookie Wilmer "Vinegar Bend" Mizell finally broke into the win column with a four - hitter as St. Louis shaded the Phillies, 5-2. The New York Giants scored two in the 16th, on a homer by Whitney Lockman, to down Pittsburgh, 5-3, for their fourth straight win.

Jim Wilson was the whole show in the Boston Braves' 2 - 1 victory over Cincinnati. He scattered seven hits and singled with the bases loaded in the second to hand Kenny Raffensberger his first loss after three wins.
