No Progress In Truce Talk

MUNSAN, Korea (AP)—Allied and Communist truce delegates produced no signs of headway in an 11-minute secret session Monday. It appeared both sides had run out of things to say in the Korean armistice deadlock.

North Korean Gen. Nam Il, chief Red delegate, spoke from notes for nine of the 11 minutes in session at Panmunjom.

Then he proposed a recess until Tuesday at 11 a. m.

Vice Adm. Turner Joy, head of the Allied delegation, emerged from the conference tent and said: "I am sorry but we are still in executive (secret) session and I can tell you nothing. We meet again tomorrow."

An Allied spokesman said Nam opened the meeting with a brief remark to which Joy responded. Then Nam spoke from prepared notes.

The secret sessions of the chief delegates began one week ago when the United Nations Command laid before the Reds a proposed over-all solution to unsettled problems.

These are focused on prisoner exchange and also include Communist nomination of Soviet Russia neutral armistice observer and an Allied demand for a ban on rehabilitation of military airfields during a truce.

Details of the proposal have not been disclosed. The Communists judged it until Friday, when they apparently rejected it.

Mrs. Toy Len Goon, frail, china-born widow, said she planned to spend Monday catching up with work in the laundry she has operated to raise eight talented children.

Mrs. Goon leaves Wednesday for a New York luncheon to be tendered her the next day by the American Mother's Committee of the Golden Rule foundation, which selected the 7-year-old native of Canton, China.

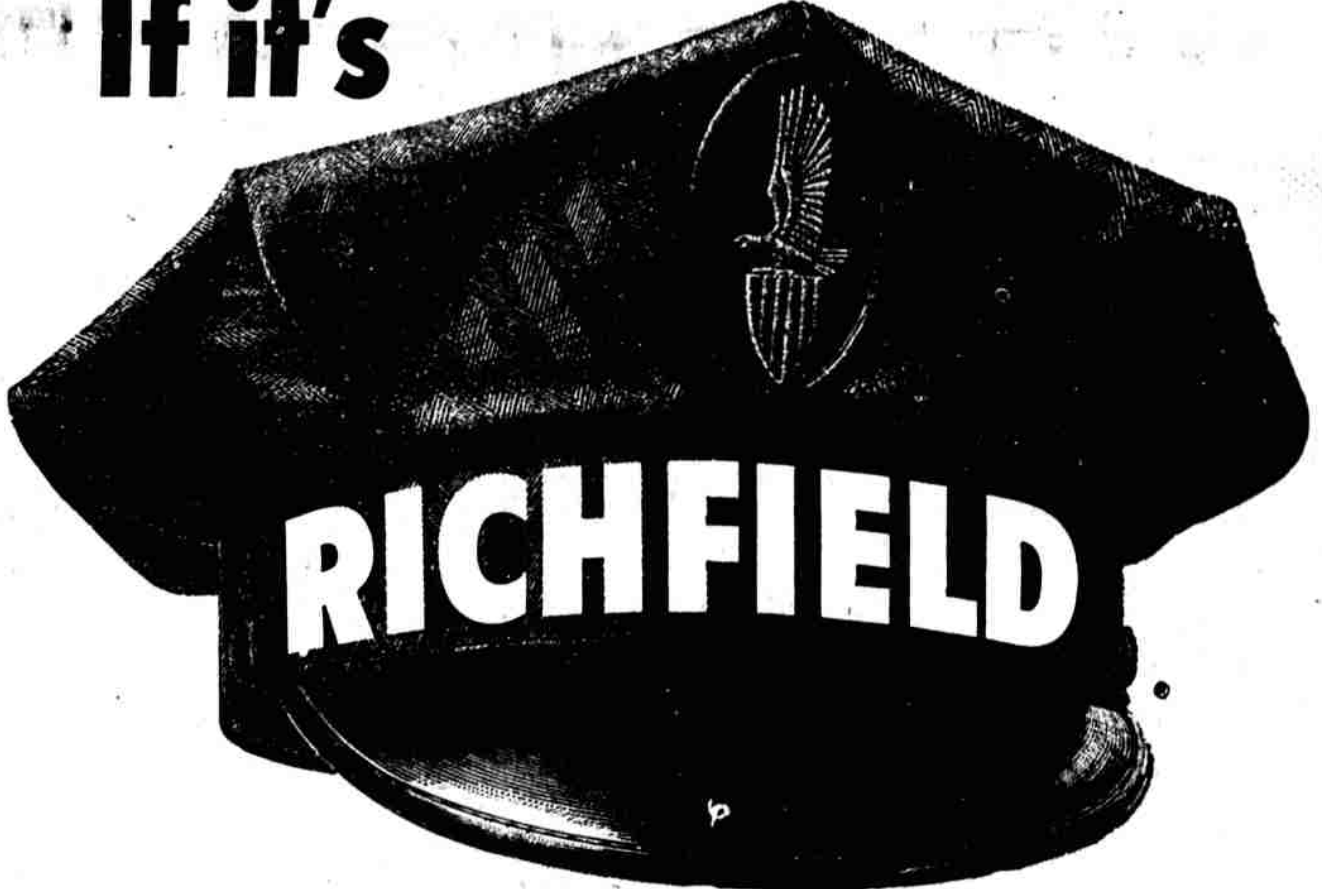
