Lodge Holds Ike Top Man
PORTLAND (AP)—Gen. Eisenhower is the best qualified candidate to make a durable peace, Sen. Cabot Lodge of Massachusetts told a rally here Monday night.
Lodge, who is Eisenhower's campaign manager, said Republicans must have a winner for their candidate in the forthcoming election.
"Every time the people have had a chance to vote for him," he said, "Eisenhower has been a winner."
Of the general's administrative experience, Lodge said:
"He handled 12 million men and the expenditure of billions of dollars and he made a good record as an administrator while president of Columbia University."
Criticizing the Truman administration Lodge said, "If Eisenhower had been president in recent years, we wouldn't have spent 80 billion dollars and have only the second best air force."

Cotton Case Figure Quits
WASHINGTON (AP)—Clovis D. Walker, central figure in a Senate investigation of government cotton buying deals, resigned Monday as director of the Agriculture Department's cotton branch.
In a letter of resignation, Walker said his action "does not constitute any implication of guilt on my part" but he felt that to stay in office, in the light of charges made against him, would be "embarrassing to the department and also detrimental to my health."
A department investigator told the Senate Agriculture Committee Friday that Walker had asked to be heard by the Senate Agriculture Committee to answer a complaint by Sen. Aiken (R-Vt.) that Brannan had tried to "cover up" wrongdoing in the farm aid program.
