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# Ammo Supply Said Plentiful

WASHINGTON (AP)—A dispatch from the Far East Command of the Army to headquarters here says that "ammunition is plentiful," but is rationed "to save money and maintain ammunition reserve."

The message was received here last Saturday, before testimony Monday by Gen. J. Lawton Collins to a Congressional committee considering military appropriations.

In that testimony, Collins said some types of ammunition had been rationed because "production still does not equal normal battle expenditures, and the World War II stocks either have been exhausted or have approached exhaustion."

The Far East Command dispatch said ammunition is rationed "but allocations are considered adequate in the present tactical situation."

Such allocation of ammunition "is a normal military precaution," the dispatch said. It added there was no restriction limiting the use of artillery ammunition only to emergencies and declared the "Eight Army fires much more ammunition daily than the Communists do."

The dispatch was in comment on a published report of ammunition and vehicle shortages.

The Far East Command said that both vehicles and ammunition are in adequate supply but that "there are, of course, local temporary shortages."

It mentioned, among the "oc-

casional temporary shortages" in the past, shortages of hand grenades.

Gen. Collins, Army chief of staff, told a Senate Appropriations subcommittee that House cuts already voted in military spending would wreck the Army's security program.

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
