The Malin Mustangs won the Klamath County Class B baseball title yesterday for the second year in a row.

A six-run binge in the sixth inning gave the Mustangs a 9-3 win over Sacred Heart's Trojans at Recreation Park.

Four Malin hits and two costly Sacred Heart errors broke up a 3-2 pitching battle between big Wayne Rick and the Trojans' Bobby Howard.

After a delectable first inning in which Malin bobbled three times Sacred Heart twice, the game settled down to a 2-3 deadlock until the sixth inning when the Mustangs exploded.

It would have been a real pitchers battle between southpaw Howard and right-hander Rick but for shoddy fielding. Malin ended with four errors, Sacred Heart was charged with six.

BETTER SUPPORT

The difference couldn't be laid to Rick's pitching, but rather to slightly better support.

Two doubles — by Gene and George Evans — combined with Sacred Heart miscues gave Malin its three runs in the first frame.

Sacred Heart collected just one hit off Rick in the first chapter — Jim Mahoney's single — but three errors and a passed ball were enough to tie the ball game.

MUFFED

Sacred Heart muffed a chance to go ahead in the third inning when Ray Beard singled but was caught napping off first base. A subsequent triple by Mahoney, who got two of the five hits off Rick, would have scored Beard.

Mahoney was left stranded when Jack Heiderer struck out.

George Rajnus, Arby Paris, George Evans and Howard Herringshaw found Howard for singles in the fatal sixth, the only bad inning for the Trojan hurler.

Malin gets a chance at sub-district play now.

Klamath Falls is the host city for the Southern Oregon District high school track and field meet Saturday.

This will mark the first time the state classic, qualifying run for the state meet, has been held in Klamath Falls.

The trackfest opens 10 a. m. on Modoc Field.

Medford, Hayward Relay champion and generally regarded as the under power of the state, will be favored to send the major share of athletes to the state meet May 16 and 17 at Oregon State College.

The first two in each event will qualify for the state meet.

Seven schools will enter athletes. In addition to Klamath Falls and Medford, they are Grants Pass, Ashland, Illinois Valley, Crater and Eagle Point.

The first six places—five in the relay—will be counted in the point total on a 10-8-6-4-2-1 basis.

The schools, generally, will be limited to three entries in the short races, four in the longer races and field events.

INDIANS' GROMEK SHUTS OUT YANKS

Steve Gromek, 32-year-old right-hander from Hamtramck, Mich., qualifies as a Yankee killer for the Cleveland Indians.

The veteran right hander, considered a second stringer on the Indian mound staff, pitched a neat 1-0 four-hitter in beating the Yanks and Allie Reynolds Tuesday night for the third time.

The last time Gromek started against the Yanks in Yankee Stadium — May 19, 1949 — he trimmed the Bombers, 3-2. The time before that — in Cleveland in 1948 — he downed the Yanks, 2-1.

Gromek's shutout was the first time a Cleveland pitcher has blanked the Yanks since Bob Fellers no-hitter in April, 1946.

Steve not only handcuffed the Yanks with four shutouts but had the crowd of 33,914 him at the finish when he retired the last three batters with the potential tying run on base.

Cleveland's triumph, in the first clash of the season between the two leading contenders for the American League flag, kept the Indians within one game of the first place Boston Red Sox, who trounced the Chicago White Sox, 11-2.
